#### **STAY IN TOUCH** WITH ENGINEERING

Fill for horse stalls does not require a fill permit. In addition, a permit may not be required if a small amount of sand is required to replenish a horse arena. However the Town recommends that a property owner or leasee contact our office to assure that the type of work being performed falls under this criteria prior to performing the work. A phone call to us will help prevent a possible warning from Code Enforcement and double fees when it comes to acquiring the required permit.

Council **Member** David S. Kuczenski

Howdy Folks:

Our Town has been quite busy. Let me begin by saying I hope everyone is being safe healthy. I personally recovered from being Covid19 positive recently. It was far from pleasant.

First, the Rural Arts and Design Advisory Board moved forward with accepting an artist to render a mural along the wall facing west at Founder's Park. I recently drove by and it is looking very nice. I think this will be a beautiful enhancement to the park. Once the project is completed, it will be advertised.

Around our Town, the intersection at Volunteer Road and Sheridan will undergo a change allowing the car dealership access directly to west-bound Sheridan. A separate aspect of that proposed change was to eliminate the U-turn at SW 146th Ave and installing a direct north-bound turning lane at Volunteer Road. Our residents objected. One of the first acts of this Council was to pass a Resolution opposing the proposed north-bound lane from eastbound Sheridan. If the final decision had been only taken from our residents, the decision to adopt the proposed change would have had no support: however, some residents on the west side of Volunteer without thinking of the consequences of increased traffic supported the proposal. The latest word on the proposal is that the intersection

will remain unchanged concerning access to Volunteer Road. We are keeping close attention on this important issue.

Another issue causing great concern with the entire Town is disposal of solid waste: both bulk and garbage. The contract for the current service provider concludes in September, and the bidding process has begun. This is not a simple project. First, the contract concerns three issues: recycling, garbage and bulk. The provider has an interest in minimalizing costs while fulfilling the contractual obligations. If the service provider needs to return to pick-up at a missed location, that adversely affects the company's profits. When employees are sick, that too adversely affect the company's profits. In the next few months, we will discuss the solid waste disposal contract. Keep an eye on the meeting agendas.

Lastly, as a Council, we are charged with preserving our rural lifestyle. Without our equestrian, farm and domestic animals, we cannot purport to be rural. If we do not protect our animal community, we cannot in good faith proclaim we are preserving our rural lifestyle. A common antagonist to the well being of our animals, many of which are quite valuable, is any loud noise associated with fireworks, including both the loud explosive commercial fireworks and the smaller bangs. As a result, we unanimously passed a resolution supporting legislation that will exempt the Town of Southwest Ranches from the statewide law permitting the use of fireworks on designated days. State Representative Robin Bartleman introduced this measure as one of her

sponsored bills. Because of the unique circumstances in our Town, I similarly believe it is critical that this local bill be passed. Without it, Southwest Ranches will be unable to protect its equestrian citizens and their horses from the danger to our prized animals associated with the use of fireworks. When our horses are startled. it is common for them to gallop and tremble, and as a result, these prized animals are subject to injury. Because of the Town of Southwest Ranches' unique position as a horse haven, our Town should be exempted from that legislation. Since the identical language passed last ' year for the Village of Wellington, we do not anticipate any obstruction to this passing. If I can be of assistance to you on Town matters, feel welcome to contact me.

## Leave the Leaves to Benefit Wildlife

When you think of what animals need, it is best to visualize natural areas where they have evolved. Natural areas are not manicured, sticks and leaves are not "cleaned up" and removed, grasses grow long, seed heads are left for songbirds to feed on, and seeds can fall where they might germinate.

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Now visualize your yard. Do you have any of the messiness of the local natural area? If not, you are likely not providing for all of the important animals that help pollinate your plants, provide pest control in your garden, and help build healthy soils.

Now you are likely asking—how can I possibly have a yard with the wildness of a natural area? For many people there is no way that they are going to give over their entire yards just to nature. After all, most yards are designed for humans not nature. That said, I believe you can provide both a great place to live, to entertain and for kids to play and provide vital winter habitat for the bees, butterflies, birds, and other wildlife that also need homes.

My yard is a great example. If I had my way, it might look like the local natural area but there are many considerations. We have been quite successful in providing for our needs and those of wildlife. We maintain enough lawn for the kids to play and where we can set up our trampoline. We also need to consider neighborhood association rules. In addition, my wife likes a little sense of tidiness.

We leave our wildflowers to go to seed for the birds—it was amazing and fun to watch how many birds fed on my sunflower seeds this year—and let our vegetable garden bolt to provide resources for pollinators. We also allow some messiness. When I finally trim back bushes, I pile the branches in out-of-the-way places where they can provide shelter for overwintering bumble bees or butterflies. An added benefit is that we have had spotted towhees nest in these same branch piles.

When the leaves fall we rake them but do not discard them. Instead, we pile them on our garden beds or in the corners of our yard where they might be used by the animals that need this shelter. In the spring, we either dig them into the garden beds or put them in the compost. I also often look at what is using these leaves. Spiders and pill bugs are common, as are predatory centipedes and beetles. Where the leaves are in contact with the soil, I often find great numbers of earthworms that help make better soil for my garden.

Leave the leaves does not mean ignoring them and leaving them where they fell. You can move them to places in your yard where they are out of the way, will not kill your turf, and will still help wildlife. A thin layer of leaves can actually help turf—but too much will kill the grass. Consider raking leaves into areas around trees, or use them as winter mulch for perennials or to cover garden beds. I have found in Oregon that a thick layer of leaves in my gar-

den beds helps minimize weed problems early in the spring and can be a great soil amendment.

We also let our neighbors know what we are doing so that they know we are not just being lazy. The same neighbors see a variety of flowers throughout the season and an abundance of pollinators and birds visiting our yard. The messiness is just an extension of our wildlife gardening and by making sure people know that wildlife need places to live year round-especially when it is cold and grey outside-it does help them understand why we should all #leavetheleaves!

So next time you have fall cleanup chores in your yard think about how you can have a yard for you, your family, and for all of the animals with which we share this planet.


#### Documents required to file a Homestead Exemption include:

• A current Florida driver's license or Florida identification card, AND

- A current voter registration card or declaration of domicile
- · Non-US citizens must also provide proof of legal residency.
- If you are a new resident to Florida, please provide your Settlement Statement from your prior out of state property.

Qualified residents 65 years of age or older as of January 1, 2022 may also apply for the additional Senior Exemption (after January 1, 2022). Seniors must bring a copy of their 2021 Income Tax Return or a copy of their 2021 Social Security 1099 form (if no tax return was filed).





On November 6, 2018, Broward County voters approved a one cent surtax to fund transportation and infrastructure improvements County-wide. The Town is using these for the Transportation Surface Drainage and Ongoing Rehabilitation of SW 196th Lane, SW 199th Avenue, SW 201st Terrace, SW 202nd Avenue, SW 48th Street, SW 48th Place, SW 49th Court, SW 50th PLace, and SW 50th Manor.

## LETS ENJOY OUR DARK SKIES

DID YOU KNOW THE TOWN IS BRINGING BEAUTIFUL DARK SKIES BACK TO THE RANCHES?

Did you know the Town is bringing beautiful dark skies back to the Ranches? In order to maintain clear visible skies at night, the Town is proactively enforcing the lighting ordinance. This will allow star gazing to become a way to spend quality time with family and loved ones.

Did you know there are health benefits to having dark skies? It helps by resetting our circadian clock. This helps improve your sleep patterns, eating habits, and regulating body temperature. Artificial lighting creates light pollution which has been linked to various chronic health conditions. Let's all do our part in preserving our night skies and preserving our rural lifestyle.

Our Code Department will continue our efforts seek out any violations proactively, however it may take some time to reach certain areas as our evening Officer only has a couple of hours of nighttime to inspect. If there are any potential violations that you would like to have addressed promptly, please contact our evening Officer, Marlon Gonzalez at 954-343-7440.

If you'd like to know whether your lighting is following our Code, please review the following sections as a reference.

The following types of lighting are prohibited:

• (A) Up-lighting, unless limited to eighteen hundred (1,800) lumens and either shielded by an architectural overhang or landscape element or used to illuminate the flag of the United States of America.

• (B) Area lights other than those with full cutoff fixtures.

• (C) Lighting that results in glare onto adjacent properties or streets; provided that fixtures activated only when motion is detected within the property upon which they are located may

cause glare if the fixture shuts off within five (5) minutes of being activated, is not aimed at any residential window, and is not consistently activated by human activity or animal activity after 11:00 p.m.

• (D) Athletic field lighting.

• (E) Streetlights within residential zoning districts, except as determined necessary by the Town Council to protect the public health, safety and welfare based upon consideration of traffic volumes and roadway conditions.

In addition to the prohibited lighting all lighting must adhere to the following standards.

• The overspill of light originating from any plot, regardless of zoning, onto any other plot or street located within a residential zoning district in the town shall not exceed one-tenth (0.1) horizontal foot-candle measured at grade level at the property line.

• Vegetation screens shall not be employed as the primary means for controlling glare. Glare control shall be achieved primarily through the use of cutoff fixtures, shields and baffles, and the appropriate application of fixture mounting height, lighting intensity, placement and angle.

• Open air parking lighting shall be controlled by automatic devices that extinguish the lighting between 11:00 p.m. and dawn.




