

It's budget time for municipalities within the state of Florida. We are compiling the budget for the

upcoming 2013-2014 fiscal year and carefully evaluating current revenues and expenditures. Town ad valorem tax revenues are based on property values. The proposed millage rate was set at the July 25th Council meeting at the Southwest Ranches historic rate of \$3.9404. While Council can lower the millage in adopting the FY '14 Budget, it cannot be raised beyond this rate. The proposed millage rate funds vital Public Safety services as well as several Town Council priorities which improve quality of life for those using the services throughout the Town. The first budget hearing is scheduled for September 12th and the second and final budget hearing is set for September 26th. I commend the Town's administration for introducing a budget that is fiscally responsible in helping us live within our means. I also express my sincere gratitude to our Town Council for their great ideas and creative suggestions in producing this budget, keeping in mind a commitment to maintain the same levels of service.

Vice Mayor Steve Breitkreuz

As a Town we have been able to tackle a lot of traffic issues. However, there is

one that still has not been addressed. That is the traffic in the 185th thru 190th streets in Town. There are a lot of issues in that section, so it has been particularly difficult to resolve.

There is the nursery traffic that comes up toward Griffin from the generally unregulated area south of 63rd. There is the through traffic that is generated by traffic that moves between Weston and Pembroke Pines. There is the traffic that comes through 185th and 188th from 190th, rather than having direct access to Griffin Road. There are the issues related to Plat 345 being a private road. Finally, there is the question associated with the completion of 184th. Lots of sticky questions and it is easier to ignore this than it is to try and come up with a compromise that starts to alleviate the traffic issues.

I have found that where you live determines to a large degree, how the solution should be fashioned. The last time I focused on this we did come to a consensus. Not total agreement but a consensus. It was a 5 step plan.

- 1) That roads in the area south of 66th would be created to allow for traffic to flow to Sheridan.
- 2) That the connector streets between 190th and 188th, 54th, and 57th would be closed off to motorized traffic and left open to pedestrian and equestrian uses.
- **3)** That Plat 345 HOA would look into where proper gates should be on 190th and 63rd.
- **4)** That 190th would be opened for 345 traffic only within their HOA.
- **5)** That if 184th were built that the Town would only accept it as a 2 lane road (One lane in each direction).

Unfortunately, we are still working on step one! Also, let me be clear that not everyone was happy with these steps. As a matter of fact, it felt more like no one was happy with all these steps. However, at the end of the day, it seemed to be the least objectionable to all of the options, including doing nothing.

As an elected official, the easiest thing to do is to steer away from this traffic problem because it tends to stir up the hornet's nest and in the end, there is no easy solution. However, the people in this area have been waiting for a solution for a very long time. As we have resolved other traffic issues, it only shines a brighter light on this one that has not been resolved.

Therefore, I am working with our Town Administration to once again open the conversation of traffic in this area. I hope that now we can focus on this issue and begin to bring a true resolution. I absolutely welcome your feedback in this process. It is not only welcome, it is essential.

A few of us have been on vacation this past month, but when you are retired like me,

you are on vacation all the time! Anyway, I hope those who have gone on vacation had a good time, now, it's time to get back to work! We have started to work on our new budget for the coming year and we all need you to get involved as much as you can. We have made a promise to keep our Town as close as we can to a rural Town and we have been very successful. It has become more difficult every year because we have had to reconsider certain projects from happening which would allow us to increase our income for the future, but to do them we would sacrifice our rural lifestyle. That is why it is important that you take part in the development of this

Once this is completed, the next step will be on more areas of the park to be built. We hope to be able to open some parts of the park by the first of next year.






A Message from Our Town Administrator...

B M P'S { BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES

The Town of Southwest Ranches is working with the South Florida Water Management District and the South Broward Drainage District to reduce nutrient runoff from our farms and nurseries that adversely impacts the Everglades.

Everyone has responsibility for protecting our water resources. In Southwest Ranches the water in our backyards is connected to the Everglades. As property owners, we can reduce nutrient pollution in the Everglades by following simple Best Management Practices:

Lawn and Property Best Management Practices

- Maintain a ring of responsibility.
 Keep fertilizers and pesticides at
 least 10 feet away from the water's
 edge when treating your lawn.
 Runoff carries nutrients and
 chemicals into adjacent canals
 and lakes. Postpone fertilizing
 when a rainfall is expected.
- Clean up spilled oil, fertilizers and pesticides and dispose of these properly. Never use storm drains for the disposal of oils or chemicals.
- When mowing near the shoreline, direct grass clippings away from the water.
- Never leave clippings on paved surfaces or blow them into storm drains. Instead, distribute grass cuttings back over the newly mowed lawn to return nutrients to the soil
- Keep storm drains free of leaves and other debris.
- Irrigate efficiently, use only as much water when and as needed.
- Minimize use of pesticides, fertilizer and chemicals. Use appropriate rates and methods and apply only as needed. Keep trees and other landscaping properly trimmed to avoid loose palm fronds, coconuts, or tree limbs from blocking the

flow of water. Do not dispose of trees or branches in lakes or canals.

• Pick up pet waste. Animal waste contains nutrients and can harbor bacteria and viruses that can be carried by stormwater runoff into nearby water bodies. Excess nutrients can cause algae blooms, fish kills and habitat destruction, while pathogens can pose health risks for humans and wildlife. A brochure on equine manure management is available at Town Hall.

Equine Best Management Practices

- Maintain a vegetative buffer strip between paddocks or pastures and canals to filter runoff and prevent soil erosion. Construct berms or swales where appropriate to retain stormwater and prevent runoff.
- Do not spread manure within 10 feet of canals or water bodies.
- Position manure piles away from canals and roadways.
- Grading of slopes that drain into canals, waterways and lakes is based on state and local requirements and designed to meet water quantity and quality criteria. Never change grades on slopes without proper review and permitting.

Together, we can protect our precious water resources. Best Management Practices are about sound practices, efficient use of resources, reduced maintenance costs, healthier landscapes and reduced impact on our environment. Best Management Practices combine research and development with science, judgment and common sense. Adhering to these practices results in better environmental stewardship and healthier water resources for us all.

Project Primal: Student Demonstration Project at Town Hall Promotes Healthful Eating

On June 12, members of Project Primal and Whole Foods' Green Mission Team visited the Southwest Ranches Town Hall to build a spiral herb garden with the help of December Lauretano-Haines.

"For years, the Town has considered the possibility of creating public gardens and has been encouraged by our granting agency partners to include permaculture projects on future park sites," Lauretano-Haines said. "We were informed about Project Primal through our Schools and Education Advisory Board chairperson and recognized an opportunity to partner with a student group as well as to incorporate permaculture into our project on site."

Project Primal's main focus is the spread of food and nutrition to the West Broward student body and its surrounding community. Project Primal Advisor Gustavo Junco began the project with the hope to educate the next generation on healthy eating and what benefits it has, as well as how to grow sustainably and organically, using energy, fertilizer, and water wisely. Building the garden for Southwest Ranches tied into

the Project's focus on community service and the spread of the idea of healthy eating.

"We hope that this will promote our project in our home community and help spread the word on what we are trying to accomplish,"

Mr. Junco said. "We plan to finance four gardens in the upcoming school year and we are constantly looking for partners in our projects. We would love to be a part of any future expansions."

During summer of 2012, Mr. Junco began contact with Melissa Gleissner, the Schools and Education Advisory Board Chair. Through her, the student group was put into contact with Lauretano-Haines and began planning the garden build in autumn of 2012. Mr. Junco spoke with the Southwest Ranches Recreation, Forestry and Natural Resources Advisory Board during the summer, and Project Primal

students later presented a possible future collaboration between the two groups.

"Input and support for all projects is sought from resident advisory Boards, and the Project Primal students presented their idea to the Recreation, Forestry and Natural Resources Advisory Board in September of 2012," Lauretano-Haines said. "Planning for the space was accomplished over a period of months, taking into account site conditions, maintenance requirements, and issues such as appearance and longevity. Staff researched plant selections and designed an overall concept plan for the student demonstration as a focal point."

Plans for the garden were finalized in February of 2013 between Lauretano-Haines and the Project Primal Executive Board. It was agreed that it would make the most sense to complete the project during summer so that students could help maintain the garden if necessary. While with most school garden Project Primal builds two wooden 8' by 4' raised beds, it was proposed by Lauretano-Haines in April to build a spiral herb bed for functional and aesthetic appeal.

"Staff hoped to create a restful, useful planting that would provide an exterior space for residents and workers alike to enjoy when visiting Town Hall and to forward Project Primal's mission of creating awareness around healthful eating and nutrition,"

In May of 2013, West Broward was visited by Melanie Haraldson, Whole Foods' Healthy Eating and Green Mission Specialist. In addition to wanting to start healthy eating projects around the school, she took interest in Project Primal. When she was informed about the upcoming Southwest Ranches Town Hall build, she immediately asked for the details so that her team could take part in it.

"Something that I really wanted to be involved in was with gardening and school gardening," Haraldson said. "When I heard about Project Primal, I thought that it was a perfect marriage and was really excited to help out and be involved with the school. There was definitely a learning component."

After planning on both Southwest Ranches' part and Project Primal's part took place, the day of the build arrived. Project Primal students, Mr. Junco, four members of the Green Mission team, and one member's daughter and niece met at West Broward to fill Mr. Junco's truck with dirt and supplies for the build. At 8:50, everyone headed out to Southwest Ranches.

"I love getting dirty and hanging out with my friends and just doing something beautiful," Project Primal member David Kalarchian said about the build. "Doing this is important because it's saving the environment and helping it grow plants so that we're not as dependent on the bigger companies."

Lauretano-Haines had already built the spiral in previous weeks so that it would be solid and ready to be filled.




The project was new and unique to all participants, and everyone worked diligently and zealously. Despite great amounts of teasing and joking, layers of cardboard were quickly laid down on the bottom of the bed to prevent weeds from breaking through. On top of that, large rocks were poured into the spiral and covered with smaller rocks before the soil was finally laid down on top. The chosen herbs, dill, basil, and rosemary, were laid out in different sections of the spiral based on how much water and sunlight they are accustomed to receiving.



"Southwest Ranches is grateful and impressed by the Project Primal organization, its students, and their professionalism is helping bring a needed project to fruition." Both Southwest Ranches and Project Primal were encouraged by the collaboration, and both sides look forward to the opportunity to work together in the future on an expansion of the existing bed.

Rapid Notify Frequently Asked Questions

PUBLIC SAFETY IS OUR FIRST PRIORITY. FIND OUT HOW WE USE THE RAPID NOTIFY SYSTEM TO KEEP YOU INFORMED.

What is Rapid Notify?

The Rapid Notify System is a software application used to send emergency alert notifications and updates to large groups of people. The system is capable of simultaneously sending an alert to thousands of people over communications platforms such as email, telephone, cell phone, SMS text message, pager and PDA.

Mass notification systems are typically used to issue voice or text messages alerting response personnel to the presence of an emergency as well as instructing residents of specific areas on how best to reduce their risk of harm in potentially life threatening situations.

When is the system used?

The Rapid Notify System can be used to warn you of possible hazards that could affect your health and safety. An alert could

be sent in the event of a major emergency such as:

- Severe Weather Conditions
- · Missing Person Alert
- · Contaminated Water
- Police Activity
- Large Fire
- · Chemical Spill
- · Evacuation Notice

How do you get my number?

The database is compiled by resident self-registration through the Town's website or by mailing in the Rapid Notify Registration Form available at Town Hall. Please visit www.southwestranches.org, click on Rapid Notify and follow the instructions for registration to add your cell phone number or other contact information to our database. Your information will be secure and will not be shared with anyone.

What should I do when I am called?

When you receive an automated phone call from the Rapid Notify system, please listen carefully to the message. You will be informed as to the nature of the situation, and may be given instructions on how to protect yourself. The message

could possibly ask you to stay indoors until further notice or to evacuate the area immediately.

What if I miss the call?

If you do not answer your phone, the system will attempt to reach you with an additional call. The system will leave a message on your answering machine if it picks up the call.

What if my number is unlisted?

The database is compiled by resident self-registration through the Town's website or by mailing in the Rapid Notify Registration Form available at Town Hall. Your information will be secure and will not be shared with anyone. The Rapid Notify system can only be accessed by authorized personnel, and all data is protected by state-of-the-art security protocols.

What can I do?

Be prepared for emergencies. Create a family emergency plan. Have an emergency supply kit readily available at home, at work, and in your car. Plan for the types of emergencies or disasters that can happen in the area where you live.
