As we close out 2021, I wish you and your

family a very special holiday time of the year. No mater how you celebrate this special time, my wish is that you will have some time set aside to spend with family and friends and are able to enjoy this special time of year.

There is a topic that I wish to bring to your attention. Perhaps you have been affected by this or perhaps not, but in the future, this is a topic that will impact all of us. Specifically, this has to do with our waste, recycle, and bulk pick up.

Our current contract for the collection portion of this service expires at the end of September of 2022. It is time for us to prepare for either moving forward with our current vendor, WastePro, or selecting a different vendor. As a Town, we have experienced frustrations with the current vendor, so initially, my feeling was that we really needed to move on to a new vendor. However, I have been researching what many of our neighboring communities are experiencing, and I am finding that we are not alone in the issues that we are experiencing. These issues are not associated with a single vendor but rather it is across nearly all municipalities. As best I can tell, it is across all of our potential vendors, which could reasonably provide this service to our Town. Specifically, I am talking about the lack of sticking to a schedule, missing pickups, and other service-related issues.

There are a lot of reasons for this, all of which I will not get into in this short article. However, the biggest issue is a lack of individuals that are available for these vendors to hire and retain. COVID has hit this industry very hard and thus keeping the trucks staffed and on the road has been difficult.

On top of that, the recycle industry has changed dramatically in the last four years. No longer is there a large market for recycle waste. Thus, we are paying for recycle, we are doing the work to recycle, but if there is no one out there to purchase the recycle material, it is processed with the non-recycle material. So, this is something that we need to seriously re-evaluate as well. We all understand the critical value to recycle. But if it is not being recycled, because no one will take it, should we be paying extra for this service?

I have brought this up at both HOA meetings and Council meetings and I have been requesting your feedback. I would like to hear your thoughts on what you would like to see in our next contract. Things that could be adjusted and things that are non-negotiable.

Understandably, as these waste companies look at where to apply their limited personnel, they want to apply them in the most profitable municipalities. Unfortunately, Southwest Ranches, with our size lots, is generally not considered the most attractive area to apply resources. However, we have a great administrative team. And with your input, we will prioritize services. (perhaps going to standard waste containers for auto pickup, perhaps removing recycle since in most cases it is not recycled, and perhaps adjusting our bulk pickup cycles). Let me be clear that no decisions have been made. We need to weigh everyone's input input before making any changes. However, the status quo does not seem to be an option. We will most likely have a workshop on this issue. I welcome your feedback prior to or certainly at that event. While this is not the most glamorous topic for our Town, it is a very important one. Please let your voice be heard.

Thank-you again for the trust and support that you have placed in me and the rest of the Council. I am thankful for this Town and what it has meant to my family. It is an honor to serve and represent you. Have a wonderful holiday season!

## Vice Mayor Bob Hartmann

Many times, when I mention that I live

in Southwest Ranches, I am asked what makes our Town so unique. There are a lot of things that make Southwest Ranches a special place; however, our neighbors, the people who started the Town and those folks committed to preserving our rural lifestyle are why we are distinct and exceptional as a community.

Recently, I was cleaning out my file cabinet and came upon notes, memos, and some old documents that we used to plan and form the Town. Paperwork was dated between 1997 and 2000 and have the names of people who were instrumental in working thru the details on how to implement the Town's new government. The folks who formed the Town were all volunteers. They were mostly members of the homeowner and civic associations across the community and their friends. Among my papers, I found the Southwest Ranches Civic Association (founding organization) volunteer contact list from March 1997 that listed Mecca Fink and Johnny Dollar (who famously said "The pavement stops here."). They were instrumental in forming the Town and later were voted in as our first Mayor and Vice Mayor respectively. Also listed are Debra Goff-Rose, Isolde Cahill, and Laura Warren who are all still engaged with our community in various ways. Additionally, Lil Sayre, Sally Brokken, and former Mayor Mecca Fink were very active in building our community over the years and have since retired from public service. These folks were all committed building a lasting community and to preserving our rural lifestyle.

Our community continues to depend on volunteers to assist with projects, serve on Town advisory boards, HOAs, civic associations, and participate in various local activities. Every December, the Council appoints board members to its permanent advisory boards and when necessary to the temporary committees. These teams of residents are organized to take on assignments

from and provide recommendations to the Council.

The current boards and committees are:

- Comprehensive Plan Advisory Board Provides input into the development of the Comprehensive Plan and makes recommendations to the Town Council. The Comprehensive Plan addresses future land use, housing, transportation, recreation and open space, conservation, utilities, public school facilities, intergovernmental coordination, and capital improvements.
- Drainage & Infrastructure Advisory Board -Provides input to the Town Council concerning the development of policies and procedures concerning filling, excavating, and clearing of lands, reviewing, and prioritizing drainage and infrastructure needs, and developing a comprehensive tertiary drainage plan.
- · Parks, Recreation, Forestry & National Resources Advisory Board - Reviews Park development and maintenance recommendations and proposes prioritization of improvement projects.
- Rural Public Arts & Design Advisory Board - Oversees creating a sense of place and branding for the Town. Also coordinates the annual calendar photo contest and Holiday Lights contest.
- Schools & Education Advisory Board The mission is to help young, qualified residents improve their lives by assisting them with education by being advocates for young people who wish to continue their education beyond high school and to develop pride in their community through community service and scholarship assistance. The Board follows the meetings of the Broward County School Board and the happenings in the local schools to provide input to the Council concerning matters affecting its residents.
- Fire Advisory Board Advises the Town Council on matters relating to the Town's Fire and EMS services.
- · Charter Review Committee Reviews the Charter and recommend revisions to strengthen it to reflect our vision and values. The committee dissolves 3/31/21.
- Public Safety and Traffic Committee- This temporary committee was formed to focus on traffic enforcement, signage, cut-through traffic, and raising overall awareness of traf-

fic and safety issues. The committee will commence in January 2022 and complete its work by the end of June.

#### PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION FILING DATES ANNOUNCED FOR TOWN OF **SOUTHWEST RANCHES**

Broward County Property Appraiser, Marty Kiar has announced special 2022 homeowner sign-up dates for Homestead, Senior and other property tax exemptions at Southwest Ranches Town Hall 13400 Griffin Road. Southwest Ranches, FL 33330.

#### 2021 Southwest Ranches Town Hall -10:00 am - 12:00 pm

December 2nd, 2021 **April 21st, 2022 January 20th, 2022** May 19th, 2022 **February 17th, 2022** June 16th, 2022 March 17th, 2022

#### Documents required to file a Homestead **Exemption include:**

- A current Florida driver's license or Florida identification card, AND
- A current voter registration card or declaration of domicile
- Non-US citizens must also provide proof of legal residency.
- If you are a new resident to Florida, please provide your Settlement Statement from your prior out of state property.

Qualified residents 65 years of age or older as of January 1, 2022 may also apply for the additional Senior Exemption (after January 1, 2022). Seniors must bring a copy of their 2021 Income Tax Return or a copy of their 2021 Social Security 1099 form (if no tax return was filed).

Our Assistant Town Administrator/Town

Clerk Russell Muniz and our Public Works Director Rod Ley have been working with me to develop a guide for our residents to apply for a Level One Fill permit (which is primarily used for maintenance purposes). Included in the guide is a chart to determine how much fill is allowed for each level based on property size. We have spent some time going through the wetlands determination process with Broward County, which is required as part of any fill permit. We put together a presentation that any property owner or resident can follow to legally apply for a Level One fill permit only. To use this guide simply go to the Town's website and click on these links in the order listed below:

- I. Departments
- 2. Public Works and Engineering
- 3. Development Permits
- 4. Level One Fill Permits -explained

Follow the guide to determine if a permit is needed for your fill requirements (i.e. (For horse stall replenishment) a permit is not needed and there are other exceptions listed in the guide.) If a permit is required, follow the steps to have Broward County make a wetlands determination. There is a \$35 charge for this if the property is 2 acres or less, if more than 2 acres, an additional \$30 is levied. The wetland determination is good for 2 years. The Town does not charge any fees for its portion of the Level One permit process.

The fees and application for a Broward County Wetland determination can all be done by computer/internet and with a credit card so there is no need to go to County offices. Follow the steps and once completed, allow a week or two for the County to

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complete their determination (the County will notify you by Email). Print the results of your determination and bring them along with the Town fill permit form filled out from the Town website and submit to Town Hall. Your application will be notarized at Town Hall at no cost to you by the staff at the time of submittal. You will then be notified by the Public Works Department when your permit is ready for pickup, usually 2 days for staff to complete. You will then be issued a permit sign that you will need to pick up at Town Hall to be displayed on your property. The permit is good for 60 days although extensions may be granted. When completed contact Town Hall and the permit sign will be picked up.

The wetland determination from the County is good for 2 years as I mentioned above. If ' more fill is desired after a year you may go to Town Hall and re-apply without having to go to through the wetlands determination process. Residents are allowed one Level One permit per year free of charge from the Town. If more fill than a Level One is desired (see chart in the guide) then a Level 2 or 3 permit is needed, which has a different set of requirements. The Administrators at Town Hall and I have tried to simplify this process in the hope that more residents will use these quidelines and not bring in illegal fill that will have consequences for them and their neighbors.

On a different note I wish everyone good health and happiness this holiday season. This is a great time of year here in the Ranches. The holidays are right around the corner, the storm season is behind us for another year and we get to enjoy some of the best weather of the year. We have a lot to be thankful for and I urge everyone to use caution when you get together with family and friends. Best wishes for the new year, 2022 is going to be a great year!

As I campaigned, I was told by you, the residents, that traffic and safety were a big concern. The purchase of laser and radar hand held units has given the police officers a lot more flexibility in setting up traffic enforcement.

A pilot program was introduced with tag readers being installed at the entrance to Rolling Oaks on 178th Avenue and Griffin Road. The Town recently authorized more cameras be positioned around Town. The cameras will be a valuable tool to the police in tracking stolen vehicles and vehicles that may have been involved in a crime in Southwest Ranches.

There have been a number of car break-ins and car thefts around Town lately. Through the hard work of our officers most of the stolen cars have been recovered. The police are constantly reminding us to not leave the key fob in the car and to lock our car doors at night.

Hence, I am excited to announce the formation of a Public Safety and Traffic Committee. The focus of this committee will be on traffic enforcement, signage, cut-through traffic and raising overall awareness of traffic and safety issues. The committee will review the Towns' community surveys, meet with the police administration, discuss

potential changes and help with messaging and community outreach. This will not be an advisory board. The committee will commence in January and expire at the end of June 2022.

This committee will consist of six residents, preferably one from each district. One appointment will be made by each Council Member and the Mayor.

Appointments will be made in December. I have the honor of serving as Council Liaison, along with Andy Berns, our Town Administrator, as Staff Liaison.

If you would like to serve on this committee and are a resident of the Town, please reach out to Town Hall and ask for an application to serve or go on-line and fill out the application. This form will help the Council Members get a better idea of who is interested in serving.

I am looking forward to working with this committee, and together we can help address the traffic and safety issues in our Town.

Friends, Neighbors, Ranchers;

We are in the 2021 Holiday Season. I do not know about you, but this has been a very tough year for many of our families and friends. Before we can move on to a New 2022, we still need to get through the Holiday Season. With this season comes an increase in crime. A large part of the crime can be prevented by first not letting an overwhelming situation distract you from your surroundings, especially in comfort zones. Always thinking of your surroundings. Look, think and listen. Frequent threats are smash and grab, property thefts, car thefts and mail thefts. It takes less than three seconds for a surreptitious individual to walk by your car, see a wallet or a purse through to the window, smash the window and run off with the prize. Last year, we saw a report where someone parked outside one of the businesses located in Regency Square, just to grab something left behind, only to return to find a broken window and personal effects stolen and sadly no suspect nearby. It only takes a second or two after your park to look around your car and say to yourself, "Out of sight, Out of Mind." If you can see it, so can the bad folks. Moving on, property thefts are also on the rise. Keep your cars locked, and take the key fob with you into your home. Do not leave your vehicles unlocked in your driveway. It takes someone less than 30 seconds to drive by, see the car mirrors extended, run to the car, pull the handle, jump inside, start and drive away. This has happened far too frequently in the past couple of years. It is an easy issue to prevent. Mail thefts also increase, and the holiday season creates incentives for unscrupulous persons. Whether it's an ugly holiday sweater you'll probably never wear (except when Mom's in town) or a precious family heirloom, holiday gifts are always special in their own way. It can be particularly distressing when packages or letters go missing any time of the year. Take the extra time to protect your mail from theft and follow the right procedures if you fall victim to this crime. Here are a few tidbits of ways to prevent mail theft:

Pick up your mail as soon as practicable. The best way to prevent mail theft is for you to pick-up your mail from your mailbox and definitely not leave it overnight. If you are expecting checks, credit cards, or other negotiable items, ask a trusted friend or neighbor to pick up your mail.

Enhance your security. Replace your standard mailbox with one that locks. Install a motion detecting surveillance camera at your front door. Install security lights.

Take your outgoing mail to the in-slots inside post offices, bring it to Town Hall where we have a large blue mailbox just outside the main door or hand it to mail carriers. Do not leave it in your mailbox. The raised red flag tells the bad folks that a possible prize awaits them in your mailbox.

If you go away on vacation, notify the post office to place a hold on your mail delivery by visiting the post office located at 6759 SW 196th Ave. in Pembroke Pines or online at holdmail.usps.com/holdmail. It is not open on weekends. (As a side note Davie Police has Homeowners Vacations Extra Watch.)

Also, sign up for the USPS's Informed Delivery, which the Postal Service rolled out last year. They email residential customers with black-and-white images of letter-sized mail that will be delivered to them that same day. Customers may sign up at www.informeddelivery.usps.com.

If you get a picture of a piece of mail that never shows up in your mailbox, you can go to the local post office for assistance. Informed Delivery is designed to provide peace of mind.

Providing the images to customers ensures that everyone in the household can see the mail each day. Someone who spots a check in the informed delivery can make a special trip home to pick it up. If you see a utility bill, you can pay it online.

Keep mind that Informed Delivery was not created to prevent mail theft.

#### Biography:

Robin Bartleman is the Florida State Representative from District 104 serving the areas of Weston, Southwest Ranches, Pembroke Pines, and Davie. After serving as the Broward County School Board At- Large Member for 16 years she was elected to her current position in 2020. She serves on Children, Families, & Seniors, Joint Select Committee for Collective Bargaining, Local Administration & Veterans Affairs, PreK- 12 Appropriations, and State Affairs committees.

#### Article:

In February, I traveled to Tallahassee for the start of the Legislative session. I successfully navigated three bills and secured over a million dollars in appropriation projects for my constituents. We are keeping our fingers crossed as these bills move to the Governor's desk.

My office successfully pushed our priorities to mitigate flooding, address health disparities, protect children of sexual assault, and improve our local infrastructure. After seeing the impacts of Tropical Storm ETA on District 104, I sponsored HB 901, legislation to deal with the impacts of inland and coastal flooding. HB 901 was absorbed into the Always Ready: Flooding and Sea-Level Rise Package. In a bipartisan effort to protect children from sexual assault, Representative Persons- Mulika (R) and I passed Serena's Law to close a loophole in our justice system. This bill empowers professionals to perform more comprehensive background checks on employees working with our children. Finally, we acquired over \$1 million in appropriation projects. These dollars will enable us to build a storm water pump station in Pembroke Pines, purchase two mobile storm water pumps for the South Broward Drainage District and upgrade the drainage and water quality system in Southwest Ranches.

As a former classroom teacher and Broward School Board Member, ensuring students receive a high-quality education is one of my tops my priorities. I sponsored HB 359 to pause the school accountability system for this year and ensure that our schools were held harmless from high stakes testing. Nothing was typical about this school year. Children faced housing and food insecurity, lost family members, and faced disruptions in the school year due to the COVID-19 pandemic. HB 359 brought media attention to this issue and started an important conversation. Thanks to school advocacy groups lobbying for this bill, an executive order was issued that incorporated language from my bill and provided relief to our schools, teachers, and students!

The Legislature also passed a voucher expansion bill that I fought against and aimed to amend on the House floor. This bill syphons dollars from public schools to unchecked voucher schools. These schools have limited regulation, do not comply with Florida's standards or testing requirements and do not



have to employ certified teachers with college degrees. Tax dollars go to these voucher schools with no check and balance system. Education advocates spent most of the session fighting changes to the Bright Futures Scholarship Program. Fortunately, this bill failed; however, the scholarship program will no longer cover textbooks.

On a positive note, the Early Learning and Early Grade Success Act passed to create an accountability system for private VPK providers. The Student Literacy Bill also passed to provide professional development for teachers and intervention for our struggling readers (voucher schools are exempt from this important piece of legislation).

Thanks to President Biden's American Rescue Plan, Florida passed its largest budget ever at \$101.5 billion. The greatest proportion invests in health care services and education. However, the Legislature once again left hundreds of millions of dollars on the table and 830,000 Floridians without health insurance by refusing to extend Medicaid. In response to this issue, I sponsored HB 201, which would have expanded Kid Care coverage and benefits for our working families. While the bill did not move this year, I will continue to file it each year so that Florida's children will have access to affordable health care. I also passed legislation through the House, which requires Medicaid to collect data based on disability, race, age, primary language, ethnicity, and sex. This data will be used to identify health care disparities so that Florida's health care dollars are spent efficiently.

There were missed opportunities to revamp Florida's failed unemployment system and to address the affordable housing crisis. The Republican Legislature passed bills that created barriers for voting, discriminated against transgender girls and limited our constitutional right to peacefully assemble. My Democratic colleagues and I vigorously questioned, debated, and filed hundreds of amendments to stop these bills. Our efforts and discussion modified these harmful bills. The transgender sports ban now excludes elementary students and the final version of HB 90 removed unnecessary forms that would have been required at the drop box.

I am happy to be home with my daughters and the residents of District 104. I welcome the opportunity to meet with you all to discuss concerns and ideas for future legislation. Please feel free to contact me at **954-668-3662** or at **robin. bartleman@myfloridahouse.gov.**


