The Parks Board is constantly gather-

ing input from residents regarding Town parks. This information may be new recommendations on uses or improvements for the park or it may be issues that people are seeing within the parks that need to be corrected. The Rural Public Arts Board recently spent time working on recommendations for the colors to be used to repaint a number of the structures in our parks. So, often the various boards work together to gather as much resident input as possible to continually work to improve our parks.

One of the ideas that has been in the works for a very long time is the improvement in the multi-purpose field at Country Estates Fishing Hole Park so it can be used for team sports. It could be baseball, softball, soccer, or some other team sport that requires a large open area. I am very excited this is moving forward. It is exciting because this has been a vision of one of our founding Council Members. Aster Knight. He also was instrumental in the creation of the Aster Knight Southwest Ranches Parks Foundation that assists in the funding of many of our projects. From day one he had a vision for having this open space fill the recreational needs of as many visitors and residents as possible, especially our own SWR youth.

As we move forward, the Parks Board is looking for your feedback. We have had issues of vandalism at a number of our parks. At Country Estates Fishing Hole Park we have replaced the basketball hoop three times, and we've also had broken windows and fencing. Now there is a concern that when we create this

open area, it could be damaged through the use of four wheelers and other offroad vehicles. We are considering cameras or creating a physical barrier. But we need everyone's help as well. I am asking that we all try to communicate just how important it is to respect our parks. They are unique, and they get a significant amount of use. So, it is up to all of us to ensure they are protected for everyone to use.

If you have any thoughts in this area, you can let me or the administration know. Or you can join in the next discussion of the Parks Board. They meet every month on the second Tuesday at 7:00 PM. Please check online for more details as we are transitioning from Zoom meetings to in-person meetings. Thank you for your assistance in keeping our parks the special place that they are!

STAY IN TOUCH WITH ENGINEERING

Fill for horse stalls does not require a fill permit. In addition, a permit may not be required if a small amount of sand is required to replenish a horse arena. However the Town recommends that a property owner or leasee contact our office to assure that the type of work being performed falls under this criteria prior to performing the work. A phone call to us will help prevent a possible warning from Code Enforcement and double fees when it comes to acquiring the required permit.

When the coronavirus pan-

demic changed life as they knew it, some people were stirred to action.

Madison Sullivan was inspired to create the Madison's Mask project by her cousin Keri, who suffered an aneurysm and was hospitalized all alone during the pandemic. She wanted to make something that would protect others and lift their spirits. Ultimately, she and a group she organized here in our Town made over 1,200 fabric masks, each delivered with a note of encouragement written by children from a local elementary school, complete with their own artwork. She delivered the masks to the Pembroke Pines Police Department, the Davie and Southwest Ranches Fire Departments, Cleveland Clinic, Allied Home Health, two Alzheimer's homes, and the COVID-19 wing at New York Presbyterian Hospital. She also volunteered with the Miami Rescue Mission and Broward Outreach Center. Additionally. Madison was honored with the Bobcat Award of Excellence from West Broward High School for community service.

For these and her other initiatives, Madison is among the 15 high school seniors in Broward County who won a Silver Knight Award as part of this year's 63rd annual Miami Herald and El Nuevo Herald program recognizing outstanding high school seniors. She is the first recipient from West Broward High School.

The Miami Herald Silver Knight Awards is one of the nation's most highly regarded student awards programs. The purpose of this awards program is to recognize outstanding students who have not only maintained good grades but have also unselfishly applied their special knowledge and talents to contribute significant service to their schools and communities. The Silver Knight Awards program was instituted at the Miami Herald in 1959 by John S. Knight, past publisher of the Miami Herald, founder and editor emeritus of Knight-Ridder Newspapers and 1968 Pulitzer Prize winner.

As said in previous columns, I am proud to know Madison and the Sullivan family. She is a person who will go far in life and achieve important things. This is another example of the recognition she deserves for her efforts and dedication to her family and community.

Pollinator Month Spotlight: Atala Butterfly

The Atala (*Eumaeus atala*) butterfly is a Florida native that nearly became extinct but is making a comeback in Florida.

This small butterfly is velvety black, red and turquoise in color. Atalas are most active in early morning or late afternoon. Males perch on the top side of leaves, females usually hang upside down underneath.

For nectar, the Atala prefers white flowers. Some of their favorite nectar plants in our landscapes are Saw palmetto, Sabal Palm, Wild coffee, and Spanish needle.

Butterflies select host plants on which to lay their eggs because the plants provide nutrition specific to the needs of their young (caterpillars). Coontie (Zamia integrifolia) is Atala's host plant. After hatching, caterpillars eat the plant's leaves, which contain a toxic chemical that does not harm the butterflies but protects them from predators.

You can find Atala butterflies fluttering in shady areas where Coontie and nectar plants are abundant.

Summer is here, with its long days and balmy evenings. We hope you will think of Southwest Ranches parks when planning for your outdoor fun.

One activity that park users in Southwest Ranches are enjoying is GEOCACHING.

Geocaching is an outdoor recreational activity, in which participants use GPS and other navigational devices to hide and seek containers called "geocaches" or "caches" anywhere in the world.

In order to play this real world treasure hunting game the only necessities are a GPS-enabled mobile phone or other GPS device, and a Geocaching.com membership (free).

A participant navigates to a specific set of coordinates and then uses clues provided to look for the cache container hidden at the coordinates'

location. There are many different types of geocaches and levels of the game, from basic/beginner to complex, multi-cache locations.

Geocaches can be found all over the world and there are literally hundreds of caches within a few-mile radius of our own Southwest Ranches back-yards! Many caches combine interest in geocaching with other special interests or skills, and locations can be quite diverse. They may be at your local park, at the end of a long trail ride, or in the parking lot of your favorite local shopping center.

Veterans Receiving the Full Exemption for Service-Connected Total and Permanent Disability May Be Eligible for a Refund

A recent change in Florida law allows for certain disabled veterans to receive a property tax refund. While the refund requirements are very specific, some property owners receiving the Full Veteran's Exemption for Total and Permanent Service-Connected Disability may be eligible for a refund on their new homesteaded property's taxes. Effective tax year 2021, homesteaded property owners receiving the Full Veteran's Exemption for Total and Permanent Service Connected Disability on a newly acquired Florida property - who also received the Full Exemption for Total and Permanent Service Connected Disability on another Florida property in the immediately preceding tax year - may be eligible to receive a partial refund of the ad valorem taxes paid for the newly acquired property in the year the property is acquired, prorated as of the date of transfer of ownership.

- Do not walk through flowing water. If you must walk in standing water, use a pole or stick to ensure the depth of the water ahead.
- Do not drive through a flooded area. Do not drive around road barriers; the road may be washed out.
- Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. Electrical current travels through water. If possible, report downed powerlines to FPL. Do not use appliances or motors that are wet unless they have been taken apart, cleaned and dried.
- Look out for animals, especially snakes. Small animals that have been flooded out of their habitat may take shelter in your home.
- Look before you step. After a flood, the ground and floors can be covered with debris.
 Surfaces that have been covered with mud can be very slippery.
- Be alert for gas leaks. If your house is serviced by gas, do not smoke, use candles or open flames unless you know the gas has not built up. Make arrangements to turn off your electricity and gas.

Financial Assistance Advice

If your home or business is damaged by a flood, you may be required to meet certain building requirements to reduce further flood damage by coming into compliance with local, state, and federal criteria. To help with these costs, financial assistance such as grants, loans, rebates and the NFIP's Increased Cost of Compliance Coverage may be available.

National Flood Insurance Program Changes

In accordance with 2014 Homeowner Flood Insurance Affordability Act, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is continuing to gradually phase out flood insurance premium subsidies on certain policyholders. The changes have and will have the greatest impact on properties located within a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) that were built prior to the adoption of Broward County's first FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) on October 26, 1972, or prior to December 31, 1974, without elevation certificate information. Get a Flood Insurance Policy

Replacing household contents damaged by floods could place a significant financial burden on a homeowner or renter without flood insurance. Just a few inches of water from a flood can cause tens of thousands of dollars in damage. Homeowner's insurance policies do not generally cover damage from floods. However, because the Town of Southwest Ranches participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), you can purchase a separate flood insurance policy from an insurance agent and benefit from the premium discount available to all Southwest Ranches residents. Flood insurance is backed by the federal government and is available to everyone, even for properties that have been flooded previously. Please note that unless there is a special condition of the mortgage, there normally is a 30-day waiting period between the time flood insurance is purchased and the time coverage is in force. Though all home and business owners in these areas with mortgages from federally regulated or insured lenders are required to buy flood insurance, all residents should consider flood insurance to protect against significant financial losses.

If your property is in the SFHA and you have a mortgage from a federally regulated or

insured lender, flood insurance is required. Even if you do not have a mortgage and you live in the SFHA or you live outside of the SFHA, all property owners and renters should carefully consider the benefits of flood insurance to protect against significant financial losses from floods. Water Quality and Flood Control Effects of Drainage Systems

The success of the drainage system in your neighborhood depends on proper maintenance of the system. The swales that are commonly located between your yard and street are part of the neighborhood's storm water management system.

Gutters, storm drain pipes, lakes, wetlands, swales and canals should be kept free of debris. It is against Town Code to dump trash in waters. The drainage system may provide both water quality and flood control benefits. Lakes, wetlands, swales and canals filter pollutants from runoff or allow pollutants to settle out. Check with the Town's Engineering Department before paving, regrading or altering swales.

Protect Property from Flooding

Losses due to floods can be reduced by implementing property protection measures. Furniture, appliances, clothing, and other movable items can be elevated within the structure or relocated away from potential flooding if time permits. You should also make an itemized inventory of your belongings including costs, dates of purchase and serial numbers.

There are several ways to protect a building from flood damage if feasible. One way is to make sure your lot is graded in a manner that will direct runoff away from your building. Another approach is to make your walls waterproof and place watertight closures over the doorways. This method is not recommended if water will rise to a depth of two feet or greater. A third approach is to raise the house above flood levels. Prior to making these modifications, consult with a certified contractor.

Build Responsibly

Strict regulations govern substantial improvements to structures in the flood plain. According to NFIP, "substantial improvement" means the cost of any repair, reconstruction, or improvement of a structure which equals or exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure either before the improvement is started or if the structure has been damaged and is being restored.

Please be advised that any new development or improvement on a property will be subject to current Town regulations and may also be subject to state and federal regulations. Please contact the Southwest Ranches Building Code Services Division at (954) 434-0008 for specific information and to report unpermitted construction activities.

Flood Risk Specialist Available to Assist Residents

The Town of Southwest Ranches wants to ensure that residents who have questions about flood risks, flood insurance, and retrofitting techniques, get answers in a timely manner. The Town Engineer is available to assist in the following areas: 1) Flood Insurance; 2) Flood Zone interpretation including base flood elevation and/or flood depth; 3) Additional FIRM information; 4) Problems not shown on FIRM; 5) Special flood related hazards; 6) Historical flood-related data; 7) Natural floodplain functions; and 8) Property protection measures. Please call the Engineering Department at (954) 434-0008 and ask to speak to the Town Engineer. You may also schedule a site visit to review flooding, drainage, and storm sewer problems, and to obtain advice on retrofitting techniques to provide additional protection. Local Flood Hazards

Floods resulting from prolonged, heavy rainfall can occur in rivers and canals that drain inland areas into the Atlantic Ocean when waterway capacities are exceeded. Flooding from heavy rainfall occurs in low-lying areas and areas near rivers and canals.

The severe flooding that occurred as a result of the exceedingly wet summers and the hurricanes of 1947 was the basis for creating what is now the South Florida Water Management District. South Florida's five-month rainy season brings more than two-thirds of the region's annual rainfall. The rainy season can also bring flooding, which may occur when large amounts of rain fall over a short period of time or from a single heavy storm, tropical system or hurricane.

Since portions of Southwest Ranches have been designated as a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), it is advisable to check the interactive map viewer to see the location of your property with respect to the SFHA. Visit http://southwestranches.org/departments/town-engineering/flood-in-surance-information) and select Flood Maps. You can also call (954) 434-0008, provide your address and zip code, and Town staff will assist you in determining SFHA information specific to your property.

Protect Natural Floodplain Functions

Although much of the natural flood plain system in South Florida has been altered and is frequently over-drained, efforts are being made to enhance many historical wetlands and canals to restore them to a more natural state. These flood plain and wetland areas buffer flood flows, remove pollutants from our surface waters, recharge groundwater and create diverse habitat systems for plants and animals. The Southwest Ranches Comprehensive Plan includes policies pertaining to flood plains and wetlands. The plan provides for protection and creation of surface waters, protection and wetlands preservation.

Map Services

Maps are an effective method of communicating information about flood hazards. Residents and businesses that are aware of potential flood hazards can take steps to avoid problems and reduce exposure to flooding. Therefore, the Town offers complementary maps to supplement and clarify the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) with information on additional hazards, flooding outside mapped areas, development regulations that affect floodplain properties, flood insurance, natural floodplain functions, and property protection measures.

A GIS mapping application for Southwest Ranches that is publicly available includes information you will need for a flood insurance policy including whether your property is in a SFHA, the community number, panel number and suffix, FIRM date, FIRM zone, base flood elevation and the elevation datum used. Additional FIRM information is also available showing areas of concern such as whether your property is located within a floodway.

The Town has mapped local drainage problem areas within the Town. In addition, the Town has a map providing information about past floods that have occurred. If you live in one of these areas, we would like to have a discussion with you regarding potential remedies.

A GIS mapping application for Southwest Ranches that is publicly available includes layers related to natural floodplain functions, specifically wetlands and fish and wildlife habitat. The map includes Broward County's wetland data to provide a comprehensive picture of where wetlands are located within the Town.

The Southwest Ranches Parks Department is leading efforts to protect wildlife habitats.

Everyone loves nature—in theory. Who doesn't enjoy the sight of a butterfly or bird in flight or a squirrel dashing along a fence?

Supporting wildlife is not just a "feel-good" thing. We need to do more than loving what we see! Habitat loss is the main force driving current high rates of extinction. When humans develop land, wetlands, pastures, and tree-covered areas are degraded. The impact on wildlife is severe. The loss of just one plant species can trigger 30 other insect, plant, and animal species to also be lost. Extinctions occur naturally, but current rates are growing alarmingly—due to human activity.

TAKING ACTION FOR WILDLIFE!

In 2018, the Town earned the National Wildlife Federation's Community Wildlife Habitat Certification. To maintain our certification, we must continue to take action and meet goals:

- **1.** A certain number of Southwest Ranches properties must become Certified Wildlife Habitats each year.
- **2.** The Town must provide education each year. Through our website, Town newsletter, and community events, we continue to share about wildlife habitats.

WAYS YOU CAN HELP:

- **1.** Wildlife needs your property can provide:
 - Food: foliage, nectar, pollen, berries, seeds, and nuts.
 - Water: sources like ponds, canals, wetlands, bird baths, puddle areas, and swales.

Cover: places to hide and feel safe such as shrubs, brush piles or even dead trees. Places to raise young.

- 2. Certify your property at https://www.nwf.org/Garden-for-Wildlife/Certify and let us know.
- 3. Spread the word: Teach children. Tell neighbors and friends.
- **4.** Practice sustainable gardening. Use native plants, conserve water, avoid using pesticides or herbicides, except in spot applications to help wildlife thrive with healthy habitat.

PROTOTYPE BARN

In furtherance of the Town's goal of preserving its rural lifestyle, the Town Council has given residents a simpler mechanism to build a barn that is in compliance with Florida statutory requirements. As such, the Town contracted with an architect who agreed to create a prototype barn drawing, in compliance with the Florida Building Code, which can be permitted for

residents throughout the Town. The plans are for a three stall barn with a tack room.

A Town resident looking to build a barn can simply purchase a predrafted architectural plan from the Town, which they then can submit, at a reduced cost, and on an expedited basis, to get a permitted barn that will be in compliance with both state and local regulations.






