# Vice Mayor Bob Hartmann

Over the past two months, disin-

formation has been spread at some local meetings and on Facebook concerning the Council's position on agricultural operations and Ag businesses in our Town. At the March 25th Council meeting, each Council Member addressed and re-affirmed their support of the Ag community. The video is on the Town's YouTube channel.

Each spoke about their personal experience and support provided to the Ag Community. All Council Members have worked on resolving the inequitable fire fees imposed on some of the Town's agricultural operations. Three Council Members including myself have either worked with horses or have family members who participated in the local equestrian community. One Council Member has a college degree in an agricultural discipline. I have worked as a horse groom from an early age, worked at two thoroughbred racetracks, and have ridden horses all my life. I've built two landscape nurseries: a large retailer in Coconut Creek and my own wholesale nursery here in SWR. Today, I have a poultry farm.

The common themes among the Council Member comments at the 3/25 meeting was that we all support the rights of our agricultural community and that all moved here for the lifestyle they help support. We also recognize that many of the nurseries in Town were pioneers of our Town and still maintain large tracts of open spaces. Some of our Ag operations are

second and third generation family operations. To preserve our rural lifestyle, it's important for these businesses to continue their operations regardless of what they raise or grow.

One of the significant concerns raised by members of the Ag community is that their voice as a group is not being heard. Each of the Council has reached out to members of the group to offer their support. The Comprehensive Plan Advisory Board (CPAB) is where most changes to the comprehensive land use plan are discussed between the board and members of the public before any recommendations are brought to the Council. Mayor Breitkreuz advocated that the Council appoint one of the Ag community group to the CPAB. At the April 8th Council meeting, the Council decided to increase the size of the CPAB by two members, and appointed Jorge Lorenzo and Daniel Pradilla, both active in our Ag community. As mentioned in previous columns, this board and all Town advisory boards are open to the public. All boards welcome input from community stakeholders and provide a forum for respectful discussion. If you have any questions or would like to have your voice heard, attend the Town's advisory board meeting, that focus on an area of concern, to learn about their activities and participate in the debate.

Neighbors, we all moved to Southwest Ranches for the rural lifestyle, the open spaces, to have animals (big and small), and to be free of government interference in our lives. If you feel that your rights are being infringed as a nursery, farm, or homeowner, please don't take it to the trolls on social media. Please contact the Mayor or any of the Council to discuss. We can help you pursue and resolve your concerns.

It has been a very strained

time in our Town with all the miscommunications being spread around.

I am speaking for myself, but I firmly believe that my fellow Council Members and our Mayor feel the same. The rural lifestyle is what makes our Town is so unique. It is not in danger of being taken away. Please listen carefully to what is being said around Town and if something does not sound right, or if you have questions, please pick up the phone, email and speak to your Council Member or Mayor. We will get you an answer and explain what is happening.

We have recently introduced a resolution that would insure if a new development were to come in, the developer would be required to see that each house plot would have enough land for a barn, if the resident chooses to have one.

We are also currently reaching out to the Agricultural community asking for their input as to how the Town and the agricultural community can work better together.

There are many concerns about the traffic throughout our Town. We now have four new laser/radar handheld units that will give the police department more ways to help slow down the traffic.

Recently Green Meadows has been hit with mailbox thefts. There are police reports ranging from burglaries to cars stolen to porch pirates. The Davie Police Department has been working hard following up on leads that have come in. We must keep our eyes and ears open for our neighbors. If you hear or see something you think is suspicious, please pick up the phone and report it to the police. Rolling Oaks had a license plate reader installed at the entrance Avenue as part of a pilot program. I believe this will deter people from coming in to commit crimes. The Council has agreed to investigate the possibility of having these license plate readers throughout the Town in the future.

# STAY IN TOUCH WITH ENGINEERING

Fill for horse stalls does not require a fill permit. In addition, a permit may not be required if a small amount of sand is required to replenish a horse arena. However the Town recommends that a property owner or leasee contact our office to assure that the type of work being performed falls under this criteria prior to performing the work. A phone call to us will help prevent a possible warning from Code Enforcement and double fees when it comes to acquiring the required permit.

Brief legislation from the March II, 2021 Town Council Regular Meeting:

- Adopted Ordinance 2021-008 adopting landscape watering restrictions in conformance with South Florida Water Management District requirements.
- **Adopted Resolution 2021-031** approving an agreement with Evans Contracting Services, Inc for the Dykes Road slip lining project.
- Adopted Resolution 2021-032 enacting a zoning in progress, to further regulate any new commercial nursery, or expansion of an existing commercial nursery for a period of time not to exceed six (6) months.
- Adopted Resolution 2021-033 approving an agreement with Crimson Technology Products for the purchase of three handheld radar units for the police department.
- Adopted Resolution 2021-034 amending the Town's advisory committee/board policy pertaining to meeting attendance.
- Adopted Resolution 2021-035 approving the second amendment to the interlocal agreement with Broward County providing for the division and distribution of the proceeds of the transportation system surtax.

Brief legislation from the March 25, 2021 Town Council Regular Meeting:

- **Adopted Ordinance 2021-009** adopting regulations prohibiting veterinary clinics, veterinary hospitals and commercial boarding and breeding kennels as principal uses in certain zoning districts.
- Adopted Resolution 2021-036 approving a settlement agreement relating to the construction of a fence and wall located within the Town's Right of Way.
- **Adopted Resolution 2021-037** enacting a zoning in progress, to further regulate any subdivision of land encumbered by a powerline transmission easement for a period of time not to exceed six (6) months.



# FILL, EXCAVATION AND SITE GRADING PERMITS

Did you know that any activity or project involving fill, excavation, dredging or grading will change the topography of a property and will require a Fill, Excavation and Site Grading Permit? This is in accordance with Chapter 4 of the Town of Southwest Ranches Code of Ordinances. Addition of fill or an excavation will have the ability to change the amount of pervious area available and the topographic elevations of a parcel. This may affect the flow of stormwater as well as the drainage pattern associated with the respective property and can negatively impact adjacent parcels. Therefore, it is essential for the Town of Southwest Ranches, Broward County and your Drainage District (either Central Broward Water Control District or South Broward Drainage District) to be able to review and monitor such activities.

There are three levels of Fill Permits – Level One, Level Two, and Level Three. The level is determined by the amount of fill being brought in and the size of the property. Please note that one large truck of fill is approximately 18 cubic yards.

- A Level One Permit is free from the Town and requires the application, a sketch showing where the fill is being applied, and the Broward County Environmental Approval.
- A Level Two permit will additionally require the Drainage District Approval and will have a fee of \$75.00.

• A Level Three permit will additionally require a topographic survey before and after, a site plan, and a fee of \$150.00.

Some examples of activities that require a permit include the construction of a berm or retaining wall, excavation to create a pond, site grading, any activity that can impact a wetland, and filling in low areas. Please note that fill will not be allowed in any surface water management areas or within the swales in the Town's right of way.

Fill material brought in shall not contain any pollution or toxic chemicals as it will adversely affect the land and ground water. Fill material that is not sufficiently permeable is not recommended.

There are several exceptions where a project will not require a Fill, Excavation and Site Grading Permit. A project with an active development permit will not require a Fill, Excavation and Site Grading Permit. This includes the construction of a new home, residential addition, pool, and deck. Routine maintenance activities such as fill for an existing horse arena or stall, tree planting, and water well repair will also not require a Fill, Excavation and Site Grading Permit. However, properties that have Agricultural Classification are not exempt and will require a Fill, Excavation and Site Grading Permit for material brought in.

# AROUND TO THOU SAICLY: Know-your-Risk

- **Do not walk through flowing water.** If you must walk in standing water, use a pole or stick to ensure the depth of the water ahead.
- Do not drive through a flooded area. Do not drive around road barriers; the road may be washed out.
- Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. Electrical current travels through water. If possible, report downed powerlines to FPL. Do not use appliances or motors that are wet unless they have been taken apart, cleaned and dried.
- Look out for animals, especially snakes. Small animals that have been flooded out of their habitat may take shelter in your home.
- Look before you step. After a flood, the ground and floors can be covered with debris. Surfaces that have been covered with mud can be very slippery.
- Be alert for gas leaks. If your house is serviced by gas, do not smoke, use candles or open flames unless you know the gas has not built up. Make arrangements to turn off your electricity and gas.

#### **Financial Assistance Advice**

If your home or business is damaged by a flood, you may be required to meet certain building requirements to reduce further flood damage by coming into compliance with local, state, and federal criteria. To help with these costs, financial assistance such as grants, loans, rebates

and the NFIP's Increased Cost of Compliance Coverage may be available.

#### **National Flood Insurance Program Changes**

In accordance with 2014 Homeowner Flood Insurance Affordability Act, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is continuing to gradually phase out flood insurance premium subsidies on certain policyholders. The changes

have and will have the greatest impact on properties located within a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) that were built prior to the adoption of Broward County's first FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) on October 26, 1972, or prior to December 31, 1974, without elevation certificate information. #### **Get a Flood Insurance Policy**

Replacing household contents damaged by floods could place a significant financial burden on a homeowner or renter without flood insurance. Just a few inches of water from a flood can cause tens of thousands of dollars in damage. Homeown-

er's insurance policies do not generally cover damage from floods. However, because the Town of Southwest Ranches participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), you can purchase a separate flood insurance policy from an insurance agent and benefit from the premium discount available to all Southwest Ranches residents. Flood insurance is backed by the federal government and is available to everyone, even for properties that have been

flooded previously. Please note that unless there is a special condition of the mortgage, there normally is a 30-day waiting period between the time flood insurance is purchased and the time coverage is in force. Though all home and business owners in these areas with mortgages from federally regulated or insured lenders are required to buy flood insurance, all residents should consider flood insurance to protect against significant financial losses.

If your property is in the SFHA and you have a mortgage from a federally regulated or insured lender, flood insurance is required. Even if you do not have a mortgage and you live in the SFHA or you live outside of the SFHA, all property owners and renters should carefully consider the benefits of flood insurance to protect against significant financial losses from floods. # Water Quality and Flood Control Effects of Drainage Systems

The success of the drainage system in your neighborhood depends on proper maintenance of the system. The swales that are commonly located between your yard and street are

part of the neighborhood's storm water management system.

Gutters, storm drain pipes, lakes, wetlands, swales and canals should be kept free of debris. It is against Town Code to dump trash in waters. The drainage system may provide both water quality and flood control benefits. Lakes, wetlands, swales and canals filter pollutants from runoff or allow pollutants to settle out. Check with the Town's Engineering Department before paving, regrading or altering swales.



#### **Protect Property from Flooding**

Losses due to floods can be reduced by implementing property protection measures. Furniture, appliances, clothing, and other movable items can be elevated within the structure or

relocated away from potential flooding if time permits. You should also make an itemized inventory of your belongings including costs, dates of purchase and serial numbers.

There are several ways to protect a building from flood damage if feasible. One way is to make sure your lot is graded in a manner that will direct runoff away from your building. Another approach is to make your walls waterproof and place watertight closures over the doorways. This method is not recommended if water will rise to a depth of two feet or greater. A third approach is to raise the house above flood levels. Prior to making these modifications, consult with a certified contractor.



#### **Build Responsibly**

Strict regulations govern substantial improvements to structures in the flood plain. According to NFIP, "substantial improvement" means the cost of any repair, reconstruction, or improvement of a structure which equals or exceeds 50 per-

cent of the market value of the structure either before the improvement is

started or if the structure has been damaged and is being restored.

Please be advised that any new development or improvement on a property will be subject to current Town regulations and may also be subject to state and federal regulations. Please contact the Southwest Ranches Building Code Services Division at (954) 434-0008 for specific information and to report unpermitted construction activities.



#### Flood Risk Specialist Available to Assist Residents

The Town of Southwest Ranches wants to ensure that residents who have questions about flood risks, flood insurance, and retrofitting techniques, get answers in a timely manner. The Town Engineer is available to assist in the following areas:

1) Flood Insurance; 2) Flood Zone interpretation including base flood elevation and/or flood depth; 3) Additional FIRM information; 4) Problems not shown on FIRM; 5) Special flood related hazards; 6) Historical flood-related data; 7) Natural floodplain functions; and 8) Property protection measures. Please call the Engineering Department at (954) 434-0008 and ask to speak to the Town Engineer. You may also schedule a site visit to review flooding, drainage, and storm sewer problems, and to obtain advice on retrofitting techniques to provide additional protection. #### **Local Flood Hazards**

Floods resulting from prolonged, heavy rainfall can occur in rivers and canals that drain inland areas into the Atlantic Ocean when waterway capacities are exceeded. Flooding from heavy rainfall occurs in low-lying areas and areas near rivers and canals.

The severe flooding that occurred as a result of the exceedingly wet summers and the hurricanes of 1947 was the basis for creating what is now the South Florida Water Management District. South Florida's five-month rainy season brings more than two-thirds of the region's annual rainfall. The rainy season can also bring flooding, which may occur when large amounts of rain fall over a short period of time or from a single heavy storm, tropical system or burricane.



Since portions of Southwest Ranches have been designated as a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), it is advisable to check the interactive map viewer to see the location of your

property with respect to the SFHA. Visit http://southwestranches.org/de-partments/town-engineering/flood-insurance-information/ and select Flood Maps. You can also call (954) 434-0008, provide your address and zip code, and Town staff will assist you in determining SFHA information specific to your property.

#### **Protect Natural Floodplain Functions**

Although much of the natural flood plain system in South Florida has been altered and is frequently over-drained, efforts are being made to enhance many historical wetlands and canals to restore them to a more natural state. These flood plain and wetland areas buffer flood flows, remove pollutants from our surface waters, recharge groundwater and create diverse habitat systems for plants and animals. The Southwest Ranches Comprehensive Plan includes policies pertaining to flood plains and wetlands. The plan

provides for protection and creation of surface waters, protection and wetlands preservation.

### **Map Services**

Maps are an effective method of communicating information about flood hazards. Residents and businesses

that are aware of potential flood hazards can take steps to avoid problems and reduce exposure to flooding. Therefore, the Town offers complementary maps to supplement and clarify the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) with information on additional hazards, flooding outside mapped areas, development regulations that affect floodplain properties, flood insurance, natural floodplain functions, and property protection measures.

A GIS mapping application for Southwest Ranches that is publicly available includes information you will need for a flood insurance policy including whether your property is in a SFHA, the community number, panel number and suffix, FIRM date, FIRM zone, base flood elevation and the elevation datum used. Additional FIRM information is also available showing areas of concern such as whether your property is located within a floodway.

The Town has mapped local drainage problem areas within the Town. In addition, the Town has a map providing information about past floods that have occurred. If you live in one of these areas, we would like to have a discussion with you regarding potential remedies.

A GIS mapping application for Southwest Ranches that is publicly available includes layers related to natural floodplain functions, specifically wetlands and fish and wildlife habitat. The map includes Broward County's wetland data to provide a comprehensive picture of where wetlands are located within the Town.


