One of the areas that are most critical to everyone, regardless of where they live in

our Town, is our Fire and EMS coverage. We are indeed very fortunate to have a great partnership with the Town of Davie. They have now been our single provider for both Fire / EMS as well as Police protection services for over a year. It has not only been a very smooth transition, and they have also provided exceptional service in both of these areas.

However, because of where our fire stations are currently located, and how the contract was written, the coverage for Fire / EMS on the western side of town is not as deep as I would like. That is where our SWR Volunteer Fire Department has become so very important. They provide a backup option should multiple calls be going on at the same time.


To further increase the benefit of the Volunteers to our Town, recently the Council voted to move the Volunteers from the location they are currently sharing with Davie at the corner of Griffin and 172nd, to a property that the town owns on the western side of town near US 27. If you are familiar with that side of town, it is the eastern section of the property that is located north of Griffin Road where the road jogs to the south just before you get to US 27. While it may not be the perfect location, it will allow for a major improvement in response times for those living in the most western parts of our town. If you live west of 195th, this is very good news!

While this transition will take several months to complete, it is already underway. It is one more way that we can work with the contracted services from Davie to provide the best possible service to all of Southwest Ranches at a cost that we can all afford.

The success of this project is an excellent example of where we are today as a Town. First of all, the project team, comprised of Town staff Emily McCord, December Lauretano-Haines and Clete Saunier did an excellent job. But, they didn't do it by themselves- everything was done under the watchful eyes of the Mayor and Council, who provided funding, oversight and support for this project.

That said, this project would never have happened without the vision and drive of our residents and volunteers. Only a few short years ago, the future of the Barn was up for debate, and there were many ideas on what should be done. Although some advocated to tear it down, a committed group pushed ever forward, recognizing the possibility of what could be.

During the design and throughout the renovation, there were countless decisions to be made. Through it all, the Rural Public Art and the Recreation, Forestry, and Natural Resources (Parks) Advisory Boards provided input and made numerous recommendations. Their involvement and support made it easy for the staff, as it was very clear what our residents envisioned for the final product. Input and financial assistance from the Aster Knight Parks Foundation also proved invaluable. This high level of frequent communication also enabled the Council to feel comfortable the project would remain "on track".

One of the joys of serving as Town Administrator is that I never have to wonder what people think. Town residents are always happy to let me know! This 'participatory' form of government makes it much easier to do my job, and direct Town staff in serving our community. Like the legs on a stool, the residents, Council and staff are all working together to ensure the future of our Town is everything it can be!

## IMPORTANT INFORMATION ON YOUR FARM STRUCTURE

Horses, chickens, goats, sheep, and even domesticated pigs. Southwest Ranchers enjoy livestock and engaging in other agricultural activities. Many residents have barns, chicken coops, greenhouses, or other agricultural structures. Some may have been built without building permits, some may have been placed in the setback, and some may have exceeded the zoning height limit or zoning limitation on maximum amount of roofed building area on a property ("plot coverage limit").

Prior to 2013, State law allowed construction of agricultural structures on "farms" without obtaining building permits. The question remained however, "What is a farm?"

Since the definition of "farm" was left ambiguous, the Town created its own regulations to define "farm" and to give farms in the Town additional protections.

In 2013, a resident in a single family area of Loxahatchee Groves put a beehive directly on his property line. His neighbor complained, but the resident contended he was a "farm", and he could keep bees wherever he liked. Loxahatchee Groves sought a legal opinion from the State Attorney General, who confirmed the property could be considered a "farm."

As a result of this opinion, and the uncertainty of the law, the State Legislature decided to take up this matter. The Town of Southwest Ranches attempted to exempt itself from this process, and proposed a local bill to maintain the Town's definition of a "farm". As a result of local opposition, however, the Town's local bill was not approved.

As such, during the 2013 legislative session, the Florida Legislature finally defined the term "farm", and in doing so limited the statute to apply only to agricultural structures on properties or portions of properties with an agricultural property tax exemption ("Ag Exemption"), or properties capable of obtaining an Ag Exemption. An Ag Exemption can only be granted by the county property appraiser, and the Town has no say in the matter.

Nearly all of the casual agricultural activities (also called "hobby farms") in the Town lack an Ag Exemption, and are not eligible for an Ag Exemption. This means that residents who constructed agricultural structures without permits and without complying with the Town's zoning regulations now have illegal structures on their property unless they have an Ag Exemption or the property appraiser has approved an Ag Exemption for the forthcoming calendar year.

Florida law does not grandfather in these pre-2013 non-conforming agricultural structures. Nor, does it obviate the need for these structures to obtain a building permit, and to be built in conformity with the Florida Building Code. The law does however, enable the Town to help its residents as it relates to zoning issues. As such, the Town has established a grandfathering process for agricultural structures that do not comply with the Town's zoning regulations, on lots that are not

AG Exempt. If affected residents follow this new procedure their agricultural structures could be considered legal under the Town's zoning code even though they do not comply with the current zoning setback, plot coverage and/or height regulations.

In order to take advantage of this process, affected residents must complete forms available at Town Hall or on the Town's website no later than June 30, 2015\*. Once the deadline passes, any agricultural structure that does not comply with a zoning regulation will be considered illegal unless, of course, the property is AG Exempt.

It is important to note that if the structure is no longer used for agricultural purposes regardless of the Town's process, the structures will be deemed in violation of the Town's Code. In addition to the application process, the owner of a property with a pre-2013 agricultural structure, will be required to complete a written acknowledgement that will then be recorded as a deed restriction in the public records to ensure that future purchasers are made aware of the agricultural structures on the property, and the need for them to reapply for the Town's exemption and be maintained as agricultural if they are to remain on the property.

The training is a measure of one's ability to work hard at a fire/emergency scene and to see at

The month of March will be dedicated to "May Day Drills". The May Day Drills are designed for a lost or trapped fire fighter. If a fire fighter becomes trapped or lost or in a dangerous situation, this training may help to save their life. There are several different training scenarios that will be conducted during this tough training. The Southwest Ranches Training Division built special props for the May Day Training and change the design at each training session. The Southwest Ranches Training Division takes pride in what they do and come with a lot of experience. All Training Officers are retired from different departments and each served from 25-34 years in the




