Dear Residents,

Hurricane Irma was a stark reminder of how vigilant we have to be when preparing for hurricane season. Many of us were prepared, but some of us were not. While we were spared from what had the potential to be a life threatening storm we need to take stock in what we can do to be better prepared. As of this writing, Town staff is reviewing our response to see what worked well and what can be improved. We are working with our partners at FP&L and the County as well as our contracted vendors to see how we can better improve communications, to facilitate a more efficient response.

While we are working to improve our response, I ask that each of you review your family's plan for dealing with the next "Irma."

- Have you made provisions for your horses, dogs, cats, and other animals, which includes enough food and water for them?
- Have you prepared your home?
- What about your trees?
- Have you properly maintained them, especially those in FPL easements?
- Do you know which numbers to call during and after a storm?

For instance, the Town's Emergency Management Hotline is 954-343-7455. To report outages or downed power lines FP&L's number is 1-800-468-8243. Have you registered for the Town's Emergency Notification system to be kept up to date

on Town activities pre, and post storm? Please visit our website and follow the links for Rapid Notify, or call Town Hall at 954-434-0008 and ask to be registered. If you would like to register with Broward County's Vulnerable Population Registry please call (954) 831-4000 or visit the Town's website at www.southwestranches.org. Let's do our part now, to be better prepared for the next storm. It's not a matter of if, it's a matter of when.

Lastly, I'd like to thank all of those who selflessly volunteered their time and their equipment to help their fellow neighbors in the aftermath of Hurricane Irma. Specifically I'd like to thank Ricky Spears, Lee Lester, John Eastman, Bob Hartmann, Mike Schroeder, and everyone else whose name I neglected to mention.

The contract with our current vendor for picking

up waste ends on September 30th. Our new contract with our new vendor, Waste Pro starts on October 1st. We had some issues with our previous vendor when it came to performing all of the scheduled pick ups on time. I believe with this new stronger contract, that issue will not be a problem going forward. However, with the new contract are some changes to service I think will be positive for our Town.

One of those changes is that the bulk pick up overage process has been streamlined. Currently the process involves having a separate car identify and mark the overage piles, leaving the overage bulk pile in place, having code enforcement come out to verify and cite the owner, and then have the resident make their own arrangements with the waste vendor to pay for and pick up the offending bulk. Going into the future the amount of bulk allowed remains the same. However the process for handling the overage is much smoother and cleaner for the Town and resident. The driver of the truck identifies an overage pile, takes pictures from multiple angles, picks up the bulk, and the resident is charged for the overage. This gets the bulk cleaned up immediately, and is more efficient and less painful for the resi-



dents. It will take a little while for this new process to settle in, but it is clearly a better process.

Second, the other change that I want to note is the change in pick up schedule. Currently there are three separate zones in Town and your bulk is picked up every other week either on Monday, Tuesday, or Wednesday morning, depending on what part of town you live in. This schedule has been in place for over 10 years. What is happening is that we are going from 3 zones to 6 zones. However, much of what you have seen in the past will not change. The day of the week of you current pick up will remain the same. The number of pick ups, once every other week, will also remain the same.

Here is what will change. For half of the Town, half of area I, half of area 2, and half of area 3, they will be split out so that their bulk pickup will be on the alternating week from what they are currently experiencing. So, for example, currently all of area 3 is picked up on the same Wednesday. Once this new contract is in place, half of what is currently area 3 will be picked up on they same Wednesday they are used to and the other half of area 3 will have their bulk picked up on the following Wednesday morning, thus being designated a new area. This sounds more complex than it is. This is a one time change to the alternate week. After that, you will put your bulk out ever other week just like you do today. This change will help our vendor to be more efficient and help our town to minimize and cost increases.

As such, the Town contracted with an architect who agreed to create a prototype barn drawing, in compliance with the Florida Building Code, which can be permitted for residents throughout the Town. The plans are for a three stall barn with a tack room.

A Town resident looking to build a barn can simply purchase a pre-drafted architectural plan from the Town, which they then can submit, at a reduced cost, and on an expedited basis, to get a permitted barn that will be in compliance with both state and local regulations.




FY 2017 - 2018 SOUTHWEST RANCHES BUDGET-IN-BRIEF

The Town of Southwest Ranches final proposed budget for FY 2018 reflects an Ad Valorem millage rate of 4.4629 mils.


This is the same millage rate as the current fiscal year. General Fund expenditures are proposed to increase by 10.7% and include the following eleven Capital Projects: Fire Wells Replacement and Installation(\$30,000), Progress on Frontier Trails Conservation Area, Calusa Corners Park, Country Estates Park, and new Parks Entranceway signs (\$175,700 in total) Transportation Projects such as Transportation Surface Drainage Ongoing Rehabilitation(TSDOR), Guardrail installation, Pavement Striping and Markers, Drainage Improvements (\$1,800,510 in total), Town Hall Complex Safety, Lightning and Drainage Improvements(\$12,500) and a new Public Safety Fire Rescue Modular Facility (\$216,315)

Where Do the Funds Come From?




General Fund Revenues \$12,153,859

Best Management Practices

Our backyards are connected to the Everglades. How cool is that? As property owners, we have a responsibility for protecting our water resources. We can reduce nutrient pollution in the Everglades by following simple Best Management Practices:

Lawn and Property Best Management Practices

- Maintain a ring of responsibility. Keep fertilizers and pesticides at least ten (10) feet away from the water's edge when treating your lawn. Runoff carries nutrients and chemicals into adjacent canals and lakes. Postpone fertilizing when a rainfall event is expected.
- Clean up spilled oil, fertilizers, and pesticides, and dispose of it properly. Never use storm drains for the disposal of oils, paint, and household chemicals.
- When mowing near the shoreline, direct grass clippings away from the water.
- Never leave clippings on paved surfaces or blow them into storm drains. Instead, distribute grass cuttings back over the newly mowed lawn to return nutrients to the soil.
- Keep storm drains free of leaves and other debris.
- Irrigate efficiently by using only as much water as needed.
- Minimize the use of pesticides, fertilizers, and chemicals. Use appropriate rates and methods and apply only as needed. Keep trees and other landscaping properly trimmed to avoid loose palm fronds, coconuts, or tree limbs from blocking the flow of water. Do not dispose of trees or branches in lakes or canals.
- Pick up pet waste. Animal waste contains nutrients and can harbor pathogens that can be carried by stormwater runoff into nearby water sources. Excess nutrients can cause algae blooms, fish kills, and habitat destruction, while pathogens can pose health risks for humans and wildlife.
- Place a silt fence around active construction sites. This will prevent any sedimentation from running off into adjacent properties and water bodies.
- Prevent erosion by seeding or placing sod. The vegetation will hold the soil together preventing sedimentation into water bodies.
- Do not litter. Dispose of trash and recyclables in their proper containers.
- Inspect your septic system. Septic systems that have not been maintained properly can release pathogens and nutrients

into nearby water bodies. Be sure to pump the tank as necessary.

Equine Best Management Practices

- Maintain a vegetative buffer strip between paddocks or pastures and canals to filter runoff and prevent soil erosion. Construct berms or swales where appropriate to retain stormwater and prevent runoff.
- Do not spread manure within 10 feet of canals or water bodies.
- Position manure piles away from canals and roadways and have it regularly picked up.
- Grading of slopes that drain into canals, waterways, and lakes is based on state and local requirements and designed to meet water quantity and quality criteria. Never change grades on slopes without proper review and permitting.

Together, we can protect our precious water resources. Best Management Practices combine research and development with science, judgment, and common sense. Adhering to these practices results in better environmental stewardship and healthier water resources for us all.



Southwest Ranches FIRE RESCUE

Our Community successfully weathered Hurricane Irma and your SWR Fire Department, operating in conjunction with Davie Fire Rescue, conducted emergency operations before, during and after the storm. Our work included:

- Responding to both emergency and non-emergency calls for service for the duration of the storm.
- Relocation of operations to Davie Station 91 during the storm so that we could maintain operations for our residents.
- Coordinated the rapid area assessment of the Town and ensured that it was reported to the County Emergency Operations Center.
- Provided emergency removal of trees and other barriers from roadways so that emergency crews could respond to residents.
- Coordinated the repair of the traffic signal at Dykes Road and Griffin Road so that traffic operations would return to normal at that intersection.
- Responded to reports of livestock animals in distress and provided water to same.
- Organized donated items from Ohio that will be sent to hurricane victims in both the Keys and the Gulf Coast of Florida.

Please keep in mind that the well pumps that provide your horses with water will not work if power is interrupted during the storm. Because of the large amounts of water required by horses, the Department recommends that all residents who have active barns make sure that there are electrical connections on your well pumps so that an emergency generator can run them for periods of time during long power service interruptions. This will allow you to provide your horses with the water they need.

National Fire Prevention week is October 8th through October 15th this year. Remember that seconds can mean the difference between escaping a fire and a tragedy. All households should have an emergency escape plan that includes a rally point that family members can go to once they are outside. The Department will be joining with the Home Depot at Rick Case Honda Way during the week. Please also watch our Facebook page for more information.

CODE ENFORCEMENT AND YOU:

"Be a good Neighbor, noise and parties that affect others. Rental of properties for parties is illegal"

Our Town of Southwest Ranches is a rural community and strives constantly to maintain the character that our founders and residents envisioned. Many times without realizing we tend to deviate or stray away from this vision, either because we forget or because we are new to our area. This article serves to communicate to our established and new residents that everyone needs to be conscious of the impact that can be created to adjacent neighbors by our actions and, "be a good neighbor."

Issues such as excessive noise created by volume and amounts of guests attending a party are becoming more prevalent Code Section 035-080 ("Indoor and outdoor assembly in rural and agricultural districts") outlines these guidelines.

- Noise Limits (volume, time of day), attendees, and parking impact.
- Our code does not allow for noise amplified or non-amplified to be audible from an adjacent dwelling or guest house (with closed windows and doors) from the hours of 8:00 p.m. to 9:00 a.m. Monday to Friday and 11:00 p.m. to 9:00 a.m. Saturdays and Sundays. Also, as related to New Years' Eve the hours where no amplified or non-amplified noise cannot be heard in the same

manner are from 1:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. on New Years' Day.

Recently there has been an influx of companies looking to lease or rent a house in the Town for a day. Their idea is to have a party at the location which in most times is advertised and a fee is collected at the door from the attendees.

· Our code does not allow for the leasing of a property for a party to a company. The property owner is required to be present during the entire event, no exceptions. Also, no fee is to be charged and no gift other than congratulatory gifts are allowed. In addition, a permit is required with a minimum of (15) days application, outlining the event type, the number of attendees, and the action plan to accommodate vehicles at the property. A family gathering that normally takes place does not require a permit unless the number of attendees exceed 30 and it occurs more than (2) times a year.

In addition, these parties have presented traffic and parking issues to adjacent neighbors due to the number of attendees and the parking of vehicles obstructing traffic and side streets. We need to be conscious that a large number of vehicles parked along our narrow streets and in front of properties, create an impact on our neighbors. The Police Department has

been called to these events because cars are blocking traffic lanes, and driveway entrances. Please be mindful of your neighbors and the impact that this issue creates.

• Vehicles are not allowed to be parked on the swale around the property in front of other property owners. A permission in writing from such owners will be required at the time of the application.

As a reminder, the Code Enforcement Department only works based on complaints from residents as it is non-pro-active in nature. We believe that everyone has the right to enjoy their property without any outside intrusion. Non-withstanding this fact when a complaint comes into the Department we have to investigate and provide the corresponding notification to the property owner.

We live in a beautiful and special Town. The Town of Southwest Ranches would like to ask for our new, established, and rental residents to be mindful of these issues to help us continue to maintain the character that we all envisioned. Let's work together to make sure that these simple guidelines are followed, so we can continue to enjoy the rural lifestyle that we all love so much and moved here for. 
