

Dear Residents,

The Town continues to work on projects that will enhance the quality of life that we all enjoy. I wanted to provide you with a summary of projects that are occurring right now in our community:

- Country Estates Fishing Hole Park: Work began on May 25th to construct two multi-use sports fields. Work is expected to be completed before July 4th, 2017.
- Calusa Corners Park: Construction to erect a pavilion, play-ground and parking improvements has been completed.
- Gary Poliakoff Founder's Pavilion: Construction of the sidewalk and pavilion is underway. Work is expected to be completed by September 21, 2017.
- **Rolling Oaks Barn Storage Room:** A storage room enclosure is in progress at the Rolling Oaks Barn. Work is expected to be completed by August 5, 2017.
- Transportation Surface and Drainage Ongoing Rehabilitation Program (TSDOR): The Town recently awarded a bid to resurface certain segments of roadway beginning October 1st. The segments represent the projects specified in Year 2 of the TSDOR program.
- **SW 54th Place Drainage Project:** The South Broward Drainage District is currently de-

signing the drainage improvements between SW 195th Lane and Frontier Trails Park. Drawings are approximately 95% complete.

- **Dykes Road Drainage:** The South Broward Drainage District is currently designing the project. This project was in part by both the South Florida Water Management District and the South Broward Drainage District. Drawings are approximately 75% complete.
- Stirling Road Guardrail: Installation of guardrails between the edge of pavement of Stirling Road and the canal bank from SW 142nd Avenue to SW 148th Avenue and between SW 136th Avenue to the 12600 block of Stirling Road (approximately 4,200 linear feet total) is scheduled. Surveying is completed and design is 50% complete.
- Entranceway Signs: Staff has submitted permit applications to Broward County and South Florida Water Management District for two new entranceway signs along Griffin Road, one near Dykes Road and the other near Bonaventure Boulevard.

I'm excited about the impact these projects will have on our community. I hope you are too. Mosquito Bite Protection **in Florida**


Not all mosquitoes are the same. Different mosquitoes spread different diseases and bite at different times of the day. Some mosquito species bite during the day, such as those mosquitoes that can spread chikungunya, dengue and Zika viruses. Other species of mosquitoes bite most often at dawn and dusk, including those that can transmit West Nile virus.

Mosquitoes can live indoors and will bite at any time, day or night. 

SERIES: THE SOUTHWEST RANCHES COMMUNITY FOREST STRUCTURAL PRUNING FOR THE SOUTHWEST RANCHES RESIDENT. PART 1

The Southwest Ranches Community Forest is so abundant that trees literally outnumber residents. Before the 2017 storm season affects us, let's get started with a solid tree pruning program.

Understanding the elements of structural tree pruning is essential to successful management of our properties. The first step is identifying objectives –or goals – of why and how to trim your trees.

The WHY: Structural Tree Pruning Objectives

Understanding why we need to prune our trees will assist in determining how the trees should be pruned. The choice among pruning methods will always depend on the tree and the situation.

The main objectives for structural tree pruning include:

- 1) Reduce risk of failure: Establish structural pruning beginning when the tree is planted and carrying through the life of the tree. This is designed to create structurally sound tree architecture that will sustain the tree for a long period.
- 2) Maintain health by cleaning the crown, removing dead, diseased, and rubbing branches, especially in mature trees. Root pruning can reduce the risk of some diseases and root-structure issues such as stem girdling roots.
- 3) Provide clearance as needed

Growth can be directed away from a building, security light, or power line; but regular pruning is required to maintain. Canopy reduction helps maintain a tree smaller than it would be without pruning. Utility pruning keeps limbs clear of overhead wires and other utility structures. Raising the canopy can provide clearance beneath the tree by shortening low

branches.


Aside from pruning for good structure and longevity of trees, other objectives for pruning can include:

- 4) Improve aesthetics
- 5) Reduce shade
- 6) Influence flower or fruit production
- 7) Improve a view

THE HOW: Types of Basic Pruning

<u>Cuts:</u> There are four types of pruning cut

Removal - leaves the branch bark ridge intact and results in even bark exposure around cut.

Reduction - (also referred to as drop-crotch cutting) shortens a branch by removing a stem back to a lateral branch that is at least one-third the diameter of the cut stem.

Heading - When the branch that remains is less than about one-third the diameter of the cut stem, the cut is considered a heading cut. Not considered appropriate in most instances in the landscape, heading cuts are sometimes necessary when attempting to restore trees following storm damage.

Removing dead branches -

Removing dead branches is good for the health of trees, but be sure not to cut into the collar of trunk wood growing out onto the dead branch remaining on the tree. Cut away dead branch tissue only.

THE HEART OF THE MATTER: Structural Pruning:

Six main strategies in a structural pruning program include:

- I. Develop or maintain a dominant leader
- 2. Identify lowest branch in the permanent canopy
- 3. Prevent branches below the permanent canopy from growing upright or too large
- 4. Space main branches along a dominant trunk
- 5. Keep all branches less than onehalf the trunk diameter
- 6. Suppress growth on branches with bark inclusions

A structural pruning program should aim to develop a strong structure in our trees by reducing defects such as upright stems; selectively favoring a single, dominant leader over time. Proper structural pruning on trees promotes longevity, decreases maintenance costs, and reduces conditions that present risk to people and property.

Next month, part Two of Structural Pruning Strategies will provide further information to help Southwest Ranches Residents understand the essentials of tree care.

CODE ENFORCEMENT AND YOU: Bulk / Hurricane Season Approaching

Once again the Hurricane Season is upon us. This article will serve as a refresher to current residents and provide essential information to our new residents regarding bulk waste do's and don'ts:

DO's

1). DO prune trees properly to improve their structure and reduce wind resistance. All residents should have a tree management plan that includes annual inspections and structural pruning well before storm season. Removing dead and detached branches and large fruits like coconuts are precautions that owners can take prior to the Hurricane Season to avoid trees causing detriment to your property or those adjacent.



- 2). DO stay below allowable bulk maximum guidelines. Remember, the maximum amount allowed per bulk pickup date is 12 cubic yards. If you are including household items as part of the pickup, they must be counted towards the maximum allowed. In addition, the branches cannot be larger than 4'-0" in length or our contractor will not be able to provide a pickup.
- **3). DO** adhere to the correct collection date and week. As a reminder, bulk can be placed out for pickup on the Saturday prior to collection week. Any items that are placed before this date may be subjected to warnings and possible fines.

DON'TS

- 1). DO NOT wait until we are under a *Hurricane Watch or Warning* to begin any yard work that would require a bulk pickup. The date may not coincide with the collection date or week and the Town will not provide a special pickup to collect these items. The items will remain in place creating flying debris that will damage your property and others.
- 2). DO NOT KILL THE TREES in an effort to prevent damage to their properties, some owners will improperly cut the trunk or large branches to reduce the height or spread of a tree. This type of pruning, called *hat-racking or topping is illegal* because it damages trees permanently. Owners who perform, or allow this abuse to be performed on their trees will be cited and could be required to replace damaged trees.

Code Enforcement works with residents to make sure your needs are met so everyone can have a safe—not sorry—Hurricane Season! We depend on each other and must work together to preserve our trees and protect our properties.

American Heart Association CPR Guidelines: quick Association, action, more teamwork key to saving more lives

People should continue to jump in quickly to give CPR, using breaths if they've been trained in CPR and employing mobile technology to speed up the rescue of cardiac arrest victims, according to the American Heart Association's 2015 Guidelines Update for Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and Emergency Cardiovascular Care (ECC).

The latest American Heart Association guidelines, published today in Circulation: Journal of the American Heart Association, highlight how guick action, proper training, use of technology and coordinated efforts can increase survival from cardiac arrest. A leading cause of death in the United States, cardiac

arrest is caused when the heart suddenly stops, usually due to an electrical malfunction in the heart that causes an irregular heartbeat and disrupts blood flow through the body. Survival depends on immediate CPR and other actions starting with bystanders.

More than 326,000 people experience cardiac arrest outside of a hospital each year and about 90 percent of them die, often because bystanders don't know how to start CPR or are afraid they'll do something wrong. The 2015 guidelines say high-quality CPR training for both bystanders and healthcare providers will help them feel more confident to act and provide better CPR to cardiac arrest victims. This guidelines update, which is intended to evolve CPR training, also recommends that all bystanders should act quickly and use mobile phones to alert dispatchers, with the ultimate goal of having immediate CPR given to all victims of cardiac arrest.
