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

Officially, the 2019 hurricane season

runs June I through Nov. 30, though this year it seems to have started on May 3 when a tropical depression spun up southeast of Florida dumping 8 inches of rain in areas surrounding Southwest Ranches. While the timeframe for hurricane season may vary year to year, there are a few things to be certain about, storms of varying intensities will come, and we need to be prepared.

My wife's family relocated to Florida when she was 12 years old, and I moved here in my mid-twenties. She has been preparing for hurricanes with her family since she was young. My family also prepared annually since I come from a hurricane prone area too. After many years of readiness, stocking our pantry, putting up water, cleaning up around the house in May, we took a year off, it was 2005; that October Wilma hit us with 134 MPH winds from the west. Fortunately we had enough food, but our generator was defective and it destroyed our well pump. We were unprepared, as a result we were miserable for the first week of a 2 1/2 week power outage. We were able to borrow a small generator from a friend in Central Florida. We agreed to never let this happen again.

Tropical storms and hurricanes are a fact of life in our region of the country. It only makes good sense to have as much information as possible to minimize the potentially devastating effects that these two natural events may cause.

As with every hurricane season regardless of forecast, knowing the essentials of how to prepare could truly

be a life saver. After you read this issue of the Southwest Rancher, put it with your hurricane supply kit. It has useful information for the time before, during, and after the storm. There are also critical phone numbers for gaining assistance and support.

One action you should take now is to sign up for the Town's **CodeRED** system. To sign up go to the Town's homepage, scroll down to the bottom, and look for the emergency preparedness tab and click on the link labeled Register for **CodeRED**. **Register with your name and cell phone to be notified about town related hur**ricane information detailed in this issue of the Rancher.

Living in South Florida means living under threat of hurricanes. I want to reassure you that the Town of Southwest Ranches is prepared for the upcoming hurricane season. The need for our residents to be prepared cannot be overstated. I encourage each and every one of you to have a plan. Having a family plan, including a supply kit, is paramount for survival during and after a hurricane. So, don't wait! I urge you to use this hurricane preparedness guide and plan today to protect yourself and your family. We are all in this together.




STAY IN TOUCH WITH ENGINEERING

Fill for horse stalls does not require a fill permit. In addition, a permit may not be required if a small amount of sand is required to replenish a horse arena. However the Town recommends that a property owner or leasee contact our office to assure that the type of work being performed falls under this criteria prior to performing the work. A phone call to us will help prevent a possible warning from Code Enforcement and double fees when it comes to acquiring the required permit.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS FOR RESIDENTS

Before an emergency threatens, all Broward County residents should have a plan in place to help ensure their safety, including those who have disabilities and/or health issues that put them at risk in an emergency. All residents should be prepared before basic services such as water, gas, electricity or telephones are cut off for an extended period of time.

If you are unable to prepare an emergency plan for yourself, ask a family member or friend to help you. Before a weather emergency or other disaster strikes, you should know what you need to do and where you need to go to be "Ready. Set. Safe."

BEFORE THE STORM

DEVELOP A HURRICANE PLAN

Just as every home should have a smoke alarm, every home should have an emergency supply kit packed and ready. Being prepared doesn't have to cost money.

Follow these steps to create a family hurricane plan.

- ☑ Charge your cell phones, ensure you have a car charger
- Fill up your vehicles with gas
- not trim trees when a storm is imminent. These items can be missiles during a storm and can cause severe damage or worse!
- ☑ Document Assets... Make a visual and written record of your assets for insurance purposes. Also, photograph the interior and exterior of your home.
- breaker on with a lamp so you will know when power is restored.
- ✓ If possible, purchase a generator and an ample supply of fuel to power the generator in the event of power outages. Safely store your generator outside when running it. Do not run your generator in an enclosed area.
- ✓ Please remember to prepare ahead for your medical needs such as dialysis, insulin, oxygen, and any prescription drugs.
- medications when an emergency is announced. Pregnant women who are two weeks from their due date, at high risk, or otherwise concerned should contact their physician.
- Make a plan for your pets and animals.

PREPARATION

A family preparedness kit is one of the most important tools at your disposal to keep your family safe in a disaster.

DRINKING WATER: At least one gallon, per person, per day for five days (preferably for two weeks). Extra water is needed for food preparation and personal hygiene. Use food-grade containers to store drinking water. You can use clean, airtight containers such as two-liter soda jugs, but no milk containers. If you re-use disposable plastic bottles do not keep them more than a month.

nonperishable packaged or canned food, canned or shelf milk, cereal, snack foods, etc.

☑ A five-day supply or more of special items such as formula, food, wipes, diapers for babies, and special foods for the elderly; toiletries and extra toilet paper

- ✓ Manual can opener/bottle opener
- ☑ Paper goods including plates, bowls, napkins, towels, plastic eating utensils, re-sealable plastic storage bags, heavy-duty aluminum foil and disposable aluminum pans
- ✓ Unscented household bleach and medicine dropper

(in case you must evacuate)

- ☑ Clothing including rain gear and sturdy shoes
- ✓ Medicines/prescription drugs: at least a two-week supply
- ✓ Flashlight and extra batteries
- ☑ Battery-operated or hand-crank radio
- ☑ Disposable batteries, car chargers or solar charger for your cell phone
- ✓ Hardline telephone with jack (not cordless)
- ✓ Pet food, cat litter and other pet care items
- axe, crowbar, chainsaw blades, tarp, duct tape, plastic trash bags/ties and heavy working gloves
- ☑ Extra charcoal or propane gas for outdoor cooking. Sterno can also be used. Never cook with any of these items inside your house. The smoke and fumes are deadly.
- ✓ Fire extinguisher (ABC type)
- ✓ Matches in a waterproof container
- Any special equipment or items you may need

Not all shelters may be open during a state of emergency. In the event of an evacuation order, monitor news reports or call the Broward County Emergency Hotline, 311 or 954-831-4000, for specific shelter openings. Emergency shelters are a service of the Broward County Commission, American Red Cross, Broward County School Board and Florida Department of Health in Broward.

PET-FRIENDLY SHELTERS

A pet-friendly shelter operated by Broward County and the Broward County Humane Society is available to residents with pets on a first-come, first-served basis. Advance, in-person registration is recommended, but not required. Call the Humane Society at **954-989-3977**.

SPECIAL NEEDS SHELTER

If you have a medical condition that requires a greater level of care than provided at a General Population Shelter, but you do not require hospitalization or a medical institution, a Special Needs Shelter may be appropriate for you. These shelters offer basic medical assistance and monitoring. Pre-registration for the Special Needs Shelter is open throughout the year, and requires your physician's involvement. To request or obtain an application for a Special Needs Shelter, call Broward County Emergency Management at **954-831-3902** (TTY **954-831-3940**). Pre-registration is strongly encouraged to ensure the shelter will be adequately prepared to meet your needs.

- Talk to your physician or health care provider about a realistic plan for your safety. Know what you can and can't do and medicines you need to remain healthy.
- If you undergo routine treatments administered by a physician's office, clinic or hospital (such as dialysis), are a home healthcare client, or require oxygen supplies, call your service provider to discuss their plans for continuing service to you in an emergency.
- Consider your sheltering options and decide on a sheltering plan that is appropriate for your needs. You should have a plan, even if your plan is to shelter at home.

VULNERABLE POPULATION

• Vulnerable Population Registry is a program that allows people who would be at risk following an emergency to register in advance so that emergency workers may plan a better response during a recovery effort. The Registry is a joint partnership between municipalities and Broward County. Each municipality may use the Vulnerable Population Registry list in a different way, based on their local recovery effort.

WHO SHOULD REGISTER

• You should register in the Vulnerable Population Registry if you elect to stay at home during an emergency and have a disability, frailty or health issue that would make you vulnerable in an emergency. If you live in an evacuation zone, you should plan to evacuate. Registration does not guarantee that you will be provided services or placed on a priority list for emergency responders. However, it will help your community be better prepared to respond.

HOW DO I REGISTER?

• The easiest way to register is online at Broward.org/Atrisk. You can register yourself, or a family member or caregiver can register for you, if you authorize them to do so. If you don't have access to a computer, you can also register by calling Town Hall, or the

Broward County Call Center at **311** or **954-831-4000 (TTY 954-831-3940)**.

REMEMBER ...

- Register only once. If you move, or no longer want to be included in the Registry, call your Town Hall or the Broward County Call Center to update or delete your registration.
- Registration is not a guarantee that you will be provided services or placed on a priority list for emergency responders, but it will help Town Hall better respond during a recovery effort.
- All information will be held in the strictest confidence as required by State law.

PREPARE IMPORTANT DOCUMENTS

- Make a list of your Personal Support Network the people you can count on to help you before, during and after an emergency. Document contact information (home, work and cell phone numbers) for each person on the list, including family members, friends, coworkers and neighbors. The individuals in your Personal Support Network should be familiar with your functional abilities and limitations.
- Create a Personal Information Card with all your health information (doctors, insurance policy numbers, hospital preferences, current medications, medical conditions, etc.) Identify your disability-related or special medical needs.

PREPARE EQUIPMENT AND COLLECT SUPPLIES

- Place identification labels on any medical-support equipment you would take to the shelter with you, such as wheelchairs, walkers and nebulizers.
- Collect your emergency supplies early. Supplies will vary, depending on whether you choose to go to a shelter or stay at home. Broward County has created a convenient shopping guide that can help you spread the expense of purchasing emergency supplies over eight weeks.
- Keep ample supplies of prescription and non-prescription medications on hand, especially during hurricane season, June 1 through November 30.

TIP FOR LARGE ANIMALS

As pet owners we need to make preparations for our four-legged family members.

No one can guarantee where your animal will be safe. The decision is yours. If you cannot make your property safe because of the condition of the barn, trees, power lines, low lying land prone to flooding, or general condition of the neighboring properties, plan on evacuating your horse at least 48 hours before the storm.

T Review all tips provided and implement as many as possible.

- ✓ Remove tools and loose objects.
- ☑ Board up barn windows
- ✓ Whether you decide to keep your animals in the barn, the pasture, or trailer them out of the area, it is very important that you have them haltered, preferably with a leather halter, and have them well identified.
- Attach a fetlock or mare band to your animal with your contact information written in permanent ink on the band.
- ✓ Place the animal's identification and contact information on a waterproof luggage tag and braid it close to the base of the horse's tail.
- Attach identification and contact information to the halter. Secure it tightly in a plastic bag and affix it to the halter with packing tape.
- If your animal is tattooed or has a microchip, make sure that the ownership information is current in the registration database.
- ☑ Spray paint you area code and telephone number on the side of the animal in a contrasting color. Use acrylic paint because it should wear off in 1-2 weeks.
- ☑ Shut off electricity to the barn before the storm. Unplug any appliances inside the barn so that they will not become energized by an electrical surge due to a lightning strike. This minimizes the chances of a fire.

ANIMAL SUPPLIES:

Water: Have enough water for up to 5 days.

Food: Be sure you have adequate supplies of hay and grain prior to the storm. You may not be able to get out for several days or longer. Grain should be stored in water-proof containers, and if possible be up off the floor. Hay should be at least 2 feet off the floor and covered well, in the event of leaks.

PET SUPPLIES:

- ✓ Large dogs need ½ gallon of water per day
- Treats
- Kitty litter

- ✓ Make sure your pet is wearing its animal license tag with identification
- ☑ Rabies certification with tag

SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLE PICK UP

Once winds exceed 40 mph, garbage trucks are taken off the regular collection routes to protect the drivers. After the storm, as soon as roads are accessible, a first priority is to collect raw garbage. The Town's

contracted hauler will collect garbage on the regular scheduled days.

Raw garbage poses a public health threat because bacteria and odor can attract scavenging animals. Do not place your raw garbage with hurricane-generated debris. The second priority will be the removal of storm-related debris.

* DO NOT PLACE BULK OUT BEFORE STORM

DURING THE STORM

Once the storm arrives, there are some additional measures you can take to keep everyone as safe as possible.

- ✓ Remain calm
- ☑ Stay indoors in a secure location, or your "safe room." The strongest part of a house is usually away from windows and exterior doors.
- ☑ Place towels along window sills and at the bottom of the door heading outside to keep water from coming in.
- ☑ Use flashlights, not candles or kerosene lamps, during the storm.
- ☑ Be aware that tornados can appear anytime during a hurricane. Monitor your local radio stations and if a tornado warning is issued, take cover in an interior hallway or "safe room."
- ☑ Stay indoors till the storm has passed. A calm period during the eye of the storm may cause some people to think the storm has passed. Remain indoors until the news stations say it is safe to move about the area.
- ☑ If your house starts to break apart, cover yourself with a mattress. If your safe room is a bathroom with a bathtub, get in the tub under a mattress.
- Use the phone for urgent calls only.

AFTER THE STORM

Some of the greatest hurricane dangers present themselves after the storm has passed. Keep these important tips in mind:

- ☑ Treat all downed power lines as if they were live. If a power line is sparking or arcing, stay away and call 911, if possible.
- ☑ Walk cautiously and avoid standing water, which may hide downed power lines or hazardous objects.
- ☑ Don't venture out in the dark because you may not see a power line that could still be energized.
- ☑ Do not drive unless it is an emergency. If power is out, traffic lights will not be working. Stop signs and street signs may have blown away. Streets will be littered with debris. Treat each intersection as a four-way stop.

STORM_DEBRIS GUIDE

- 1. Separate hurricane vegetative and structural debris items.
- 2. Debris must be in front of your residence or it will not be removed.
- 3. Do not place debris near power poles.
- 4. Do not obstruct fire wells and hydrants with debris.
- 5. Do not place debris on utility boxes.
- 6. Place debris away from mailboxes.
- 7. Do not place debris in the street, causing a public safety hazard.

NOTE: VACANT LOTS, COMMERCIAL PROPERTY, NURSERIES, NURSERY DEBRIS AND LAND CLEARING ARE NOT APPROVED FOR GOVERNMENT-FUNDED DEBRIS PICKUP. DEBRIS PILED ON VACANT LOTS WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.

The town will post debris pickup information on the town website, social media, emergency notification, message boards and pre-recorded emergency message for Southwest Ranches residents (954) 343-7455. Please call Town Hall if you have questions about the disaster clean-up process: (954) 434-0008.

PERSONAL PROPERTY

It is important to take photos of damaged areas and possessions. Make temporary repairs to protect your home or property from further damage. Cover holes in the roof or walls with plywood and use heavy-duty plastic to cover broken windows. Keep records, bills and paid invoices until your insurance representative visits. Notify your insurance agent as soon as possible. If you have a downed tree in your yard, and it is not blocking a road, and has not downed a power line, it is your responsibility to remove the tree. Downed trees on private properties are the responsibility of the homeowner. Clean up the premises and remove debris within the time limits imposed by the Town and FEMA if applicable.

PORTABLE, GASOLINE-POWERED GENERATORS

☑ Thoroughly read and follow the manufacturer's instructions to avoid dangerous shortcuts and ensure the safe operation of your generator.

☑ Set it up outside, away from all open windows, including neighbors' windows, to prevent deadly exhaust from entering a home or business.

☑ Use a heavy-duty extension cord rated for outdoor use to keep the generator safely outdoors. If the appliance has a three-prong plug, always use a three-prong extension cord.

☑ Consider using a battery-operated carbon monoxide alarm to be alerted if carbon monoxide levels become dangerous.

☑ Connect appliances directly to it. Do not wire your generator directly to your breaker or fuse box, because the power you generate may flow back into power lines and cause severe injuries, or even kill a neighbor or utility crew working to restore power.

☑ Turn connected appliances on one at a time, never exceeding the generator's rated wattage.

☑ Don't touch a generator if you are wet or are standing in water or on damp ground.

✓ Never refuel a hot generator or one that is running – hot engine parts or exhaust can ignite gasoline.

☑ Don't leave a running generator unattended; turn it off at night and when away from home.

drawing, in compliance with the Florida Building Code, which can be permitted for residents throughout the Town. The plans are for a three stall barn with a tack room.



> May 20th, 2019 10:30 AM - 12:30 PM June 17th. 2019 10:30 AM - 12:30 PM

Documents required to file a Homestead Exemption include:

- A current Florida driver's license or Florida identification card, AND
- A current voter registration card or declaration of domicile
- Non-US citizens must also provide proof of legal residency.
- If you are a new resident to Florida, please provide your Settlement Statement from your prior out of state property.

Qualified residents 65 years of age or older as of January 1, 2019 may also apply for the Low-Income Senior Exemption. In order to qualify for the Low-Income Senior Exemption for 2019, an applicant must be 65 or older as of January 1, 2019, receive the Homestead Exemption on the property and have a combined household adjusted gross income for 2018 not exceeding \$30,174. Seniors must bring a copy of their 2018 Income Tax Return or a copy of their 2018 Social Security 1099 form (if no tax return was filed).

Your Butterfly Garden: SPANISH NEEDLE Bidens alba

Often maligned as a weed, Spanish needles (as they are commonly known) are an ecologically significant and extremely beneficial pollinator species, providing nectar sources to a variety of butterflies and bees. Sun and drought tolerant, as well as easy to grow and cultivate, B. alba leaves are edible (use them in salads), and may be used as medicinal remedies. Yeast collected from the plants has even been used to brew beer!

The Florida Federation of Garden Clubs recently awarded one of its 2019 Ella P. Woods Paths of Sunshine Award to FDOT District 6 (Tamiami Trail in Miami between 177th and 172nd Avenues). This award recognizes the Florida Department of Transportation's commitment to native wildflower and plant conservation, and its understanding the importance of conserving and managing naturally occurring roadside wildflowers: our native Bidens alba.



Southwest Ranches FIRE RESCUE

BE PREPARED FOR HURRICANE SEASON

The critical/vulnerable time for residents is between June 1 and November 30th. Start preparing now and here are some other helpful hurricane tips.



- <u>Plan in advance</u>: if evacuating out of the area, leave early. Plan to leave at least 48 hours in advance and no later than the issuance of a hurricane watch.
- Identify a safe room such as an interior room with no windows.
- Make sure you have flashlights and other lighting, batteries medications, water and non-perishable foods etc.
- Remember, your pets need shelter, water, food and several days supply of their medications.
- Make sure your yard debris are contained (and remove unwanted articles to the dump) and trees are trimmed especially away from power lines. The closer to a threat of a hurricane, it could cost more to have your trees trimmed so, get it done early
- Have a pre-hurricane drill with your family members on Safety procedures and an emergency evacuation plan. Once the storm hits that is not the time to start planning.

THE VULNERABLE POPULATION REGISTRY

WHO SHOULD REGISTER...

You should register in the Vulnerable Population Registry if you are at risk due to a disability, frailty or health issue, regardless of age, AND elect to stay at home in the event of a hurricane or other emergency. Registration information will be used for planning purposes only. Registration does not guarantee that you will be provided assistance.

If you have a special medical need, you are strongly encouraged to register for Broward County's Special Needs Shelter. Registration should be in advance before a storm threatens. To register for a Special Needs Shelter and/or transportation to the shelter, call Broward County Human Services

Department at 954-357-6385 (TTY 954-357-5608). There are some limitations, so be sure to inquire about your specific situation when you call to register.

If you are in an evacuation zone you are strongly encouraged to evacuate to a safe refuge with a family member or friend. A Red Cross General Population Shelter should be a refuge of last resort.

The Vulnerable Population Registry is a year-round, hazard program that allows people who would be at risk to register in advance of an emergency so the town may plan a better response during a recovery effort. Any questions call Town Hall (954) 434-0008
